DOUBTFUL IF NIAGARA POWER WILL BE DELIVERED IN LONDON

Aldermen Discuss Question and Also Municipal Ownership Scheme.

Mayor Judd's message to the council respecting municipal control of the gas, electric light and street railway plants, and the government of the city by a commission, came before No. 3 committee at its regular meeting last evening.

Before devoting much time to the matter, however, the committee, on motion of Ald. Booth, decided to instruct Chairman Matthews to wait on City Solicitor Meredith and ascertain if the city has power to expropriate the gas, electric and street-lighting plants when the gas company's franchise expires; what power is possessed by the city in view of the act passed at the last session of the Legislature in respect to electric companies; if the Commee act applies in the case of the city securing power from Niagara and distributing it; and if it will be necessary for the city to own the present London electric powerhouse in order to supply citizens and the street railway with light and power from Niagara.

First Find Cost.

Ald. Matthews said the first move on part of the city will be to find at what figure 10,000-horsepower from Niagara can be obtained. This amount is being sought for London. "I don't consider the city would need to buy the electric plant at any price," said the chairman.

It appears to me to be nothing more than a plan to unload the plant on the city," said Ald. Booth, who then suggested that the chairman should consult with the city solicitor. "Why should we negotiate with these companies when we are inquiring about Niagara power?" he asked. "If we got the power from the Falls, these plants would be absolutely worthless to us. It seems very strange to me that in the beginning of the year the council should give the gas company power to increase its stock, and then have a move started to turn about and purchase it. If the city wanted to buy the gas plant, why didn't it start to negotiate before now, when the additional stock will have to be bought?"

Will Offer to Sell Out.
Ald. Matthews declared that if London gets electric power from Niagara, the two companies now doing business here will come to the city and offer their plants for sale.

Ald. Stevenson agreed with the

chairman, saying that the same thing had occurred at Winnipeg. When a move was made there to bring power from a distance, the price of power charged by the local concerns dropped from \$60 per horsepower per annum to \$18.

Ald. Matthews replied that if Niagara power delivered in London will cost more than at present, it certainly will never come.

"Well," said Ald. Stevenson, "you can bank on it that it will never reach London."

The matter then dropped.

Inspectors Have a Kick.

Messrs. Harry Turner and Martin Morikin, street watering inspectors, waited on the committee, and entered a protest against being allowed only half pay since Oct. 2 (as decided by Engineer Graydon), because very little watering was done. They claimed that although a reduced amount of watering was possible, owing to the scarcity at Springbank, they had to spend almost as much time in following their duties, reporting four times a day to the engineer.

"I want full pay or nothing," said Mr. Turner. "If the aldermen want to keep one-half of my wages, they can have every cent of it."

The committee will pay both inspectors in full.

Contractor Robinson objected to a reduction of \$10 from his last street watering account. The other contractors, he said, had only been deducted \$6 for the "dry" period. The matter was left for Mr. Robinson to thrash it out with the city engineer.

Laid This Over

The committee did not care to wrestle with the question of converting the east end town hall into a market house and purchasing the adjoining property on Dundas street for market purposes. It was felt that it would be a waste of time at present, as the committee is not in a position to buy a site for a new fire hall and to erect a building. For this reason it was considered wise to report "progre."

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HELD TO BLAME FOR INTEMPERANCE

Black Knight Scores All Who Indorse License System by Their Votes.

Rev. J. H. Hector, the "Black Knight," addressed a largely-attended meeting last evening in Adelaide Street Church, under the auspices of the London Temperance League. It was a union meeting of the congregations of the Centennial Methodist and King Street Presbyterian churches taking part, and every seat was filled. Rev. Mr. Martin, of the Hamilton Road Methodist Church, made the opening prayer. Secretary McDermid outlined the objects of the league's enterprise under the headings: "Educational Work," "Law Enforcement," and "Moral Reform."

Miss Hector sang a solo, and then Rev. T. T. Shields, who presided, introduced the speaker of the evening.

The "Black Knight's" address was along the lines familiar to all who have listened to other advocates of total abstinence and prohibition, but his wit and drollery, and his numerous anecdotes illustrating his strong points, kept the large audience in good humor and held their close attention.

Mr. Hector claimed that the proposed abolition of the liquor traffic was the greatest living question before the world to-day. He quoted from a statement made by the British Privy Council to the effect that "The liquor trade exists only by permission of the community where it is carried on, and then proceeded to argue that respectable citizens and church members, whose votes upheld the license system, were in fact responsible for the awful evils that result from intemperance.

Tradesmen and manufacturers in various lines of business, the speaker said, felt an honest pride in displaying the results of their enterprise as a handiwork, but the liquor dealer is not proud of his product—the miserable drunkard. "The rum curse lives," he said, "in spite of all our churches and religious societies, and will continue to exist until Christians cut away from party and cease to legalize the sale of liquor." Christ, he said, had summarized the moral law in two clauses—love to God and love to our neighbor. The first is the Christian's religion, and the second is his politics. If he would show love to his neighbor he should save him from the evil influences and effects that follow in the train of the liquor traffic.

Mr. Hector made a strong plea for local option; and he commended the Temperance League for its opposition to the cigarette habit. Mr. and Miss Hector enlivened the evening with their singing. The "Knight" himself taking part in two selections. A collection that amounted to nearly \$30 was taken up in aid of the Temperance League's operations. Rev. Mr. Rogers, of King Street Presbyterian Church, closed the meeting with the benediction.

Mr. Hector will address a meeting in Askin Street Methodist Church this evening.
