

lee exercises given by the presidents a net gain in membership, the national convention of the Woman's Christian Temperance Union, which has been in session here since last Friday, was brought to a close tonight. In point of numbers and volume of business transacted the convention

was easily one of the most interesting in the history of the organization. The adoption of a number of resolutions, among them one asking President Roosevelt to mention in his annual message to Congress the liquor traffic as "one of the evils that menace our nation," together with a number of other recommendations of various interests, was among the important features of the day's proceedings.

At the morning session a resolution deprecating mob law and lynching, and calling for Government protection for all accused persons until justice is meted out by the courts, was passed. Another resolution was adopted requesting President Roosevelt to instruct the delegates to the second international congress to favor the recommendation of the international union that The Hague conference be given a more permanent influence in the organized functions of diplomacy.
