The Great Eastern.
An Allish Craig inquirer asks: "Was the Great Eastern built for the express purpose of laying the Atlantic cable?" The big steamer was built for the East India trade, and was intended to carry enough coal for the voyage, out and home. When the "leviathan of the deep" was launched, it was found that her draft was so great that there was no East Indian port that she could safely enter. But her failure in this respect was overbalanced by her success in carrying and assisting to lay the first Atlantic cable, as there was at that time no other vessels large and strong enough for the purpose.

A Landmark Goes.
The demolition and removal of the old frame building, Nos. 9 and 11, north side of Dundas street, West London, recalls the fact that it was built in about 1878 for a tavern by the late John O'Mara, father of Mr. Michael O'Mara (of Market Lane), and was licensed as the Kensington Hotel, being one of the five taverns in the then village of Petersville. It has been unoccupied for some years and had become unfit for occupation.

MILK SUPPLY FAIR SAYS BD. OF HEALTH

Reports on the Subject Presented by Dr. Hutchinson and Dr. Tamlin, V.S.

A meeting of the board of health was held yesterday afternoon at 4:30 in the city hall. Those present were Dr. Niven (chairman), Mayor Judd, ex-Ald. Taylor, Harry Clarke, ex-Ald. Skinner and Secretary Baker.

Dr. Hutchinson's report regarding the health of the city for the month of June and July was read. The number of deaths through consumption was high. On the whole the health of the city continued to be good.

Dr. Tamlin considered that cattle milk supply was read, when it was shown, considering the poor pasture, and the high cost of hay and other feed, that the percentage of butter fat of 3.8 was fairly satisfactory.

During the past six months there had been nine cows found with contagious disease. Three were killed and the remainder removed from the dairy herds.

Dr. Tambling considered that cattle should be treated once a year for tuberculosis to enable them to fight contagion.

A petition signed by the proprietors and landowners near Hyman's tannery was read, stating that they are ready to pay part of the expense of tiling Carling's creek, west of the tannery, providing the work is done at once.

Dr. Niven moved that the matter be sent to the city council to be done as a local improvement.

The matter of tiling the Scanlan drain on the eastern outskirts of the city, into which has been dumped all kinds of refuse, was referred to the London Township council.

It was moved and seconded that a bylaw be introduced by the city council to prohibit garbage being conveyed through the city in day time, unless carried in covered wagons, which would prevent unsanitary droppings flying about the streets.

The unsanitary condition of certain buildings in various parts of the city was discussed. The proprietors will be notified to give them attention at once.

He said he warned his gang to run because he feared the train would not round the curve without an accident.

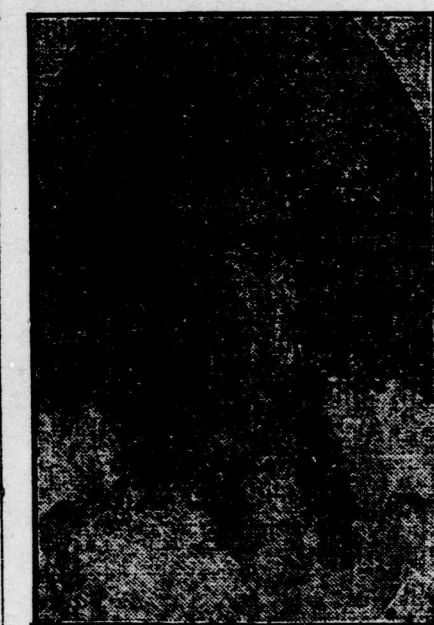

Toronto, Sept. 10.—Government Railway Inspector McCall held an investigation regarding the Horseshoe curve disaster. Dispatcher Allison, who has charge of the ticker at the Union Station, was under fire for some time, but the running sheets and orders were not, it is understood, responsible for the mishap. The orders issued by the Orangeville operator were also according to the law. The officials declined to give out the result of today's investigation, but it was learned that no blame could be attached to the dispatching department.

BACK TO BABIES FROM PET DOGS

Diamond Merchant's Wife in Love With Incubator Mite—Abjures Canines.

New York, Sept. 11.—Her visit to the Infant Incubator Institution in Dreamland, Coney Island, has inspired Mrs. Joseph V. Mayer, of No. 157 West One Hundred and Fifty-Seventh street, to rear one of the helpless human mites who have been rescued from death through the incubator. She has deposited \$2,000 with the Jenkins Trust Company, of Coney Island, as security, for the child's education.

More than this Mrs. Mayer, who is the wife of a wealthy Maiden Lane diamond merchant, announced her intention of starting a club of women, to aid in educating poor children. She has discarded her pet spaniel, on which she lavished care and money, and said she expected that other women who had spent hundreds of dollars on pet dogs and Teddy bears would be induced to follow her example.

Mrs. Mayer had a spaniel that had as much if not more attention than a child. The animal took its daily ride in Central Park accompanied by a footman and nurse. It had a luxurious couch and the finest foods suited to the canine palate.

The dog was in Mrs. Mayer's arms when she visited Dreamland. She was greatly interested when in the Incubator Institution. In one of the incubators was a baby not as large as half the spaniel. Mrs. Mayer held. She sought Dr. Fischer, who is in charge, and he showed her pictures of plump children four and five years old who had been saved through the incubator. He told her of the many poor families who were hardly able to support their children even after the incubator had made certain their chance to live.

Mrs. Mayer was greatly moved. She visited the institution again and expressed her desire to adopt a child. This, it was explained to her, could not be arranged fully, but she could be appointed the child's guardian and have charge of its education.

It was arranged with the mother of one of the infant boys that he shall become a member of the Mayer family when three years old. Mrs. Mayer promised she would give the child all the care of a mother.

"It does not cost more to educate a child than it does to support a spaniel as rich women do," said Mrs. Mayer. Many of them spend as much time and money on Teddy bears as would feed a child. I shall organize a woman's club to aid poor children in place of dogs and Teddy bears."

THE CAREFUL KAISER

Thinks That a Shilling Each Is Too Much for Buttons.

Berlin, Sept. 10.—German frugality was displayed in exalted circles at the autumn review of the fleet. The Princess Victoria Luise ordered a pretty naval costume which pleased her in every way except as to the buttons, which did not seem worthy of the dress. The dressmaker suggested that they should be replaced by others which she showed and which were worth a shilling each. The price appeared to be too high for the young lady, who said she must first ask her papa (the Kaiser). When the dressmaker returned in the evening to hear the decision the princess said that her father would not let her have the buttons. He said they were too dear, and that she must not be extravagant. The princess wore for the review the pretty dress with the despised buttons.

Corporal Frank Hayden of the army recruiting station, who spent a year of army service in China, says it is a good country to "soldier" in. "The worst things about China and the islands," he said, "is that there's no one to associate with except natives. Otherwise they're good places, China especially, to do military service. Food of good quality is very cheap. We could buy 175 eggs there for 50 cents American money or \$1 'Mex.' Ten cents would buy a fine fat chicken and 60 cents a good sheep. The Chinese are good cooks and we could employ one for a very little money over his board."
