GENERALLY FAIR AND COLD.

Toronto, Ont., Oct. 11-11 p.m.—The low area which was centered in Michigan last night has moved very slowly across the lower lakes, and there are indications that it will be absorbed by a storm now developing on the Midwestern coast, which will probably cause gales and rain in the Gulf of St. Lawrence and Maritime Provinces. Fair weather in the lake region will probably be of short duration, as another important low area is moving quickly eastward across the North-west Territories. Minimum and maximum temperatures: Victoria, 50-56; Kamloops, 44-56; Prince Albert, 28-50; Qu'Appelle, 38-56; Winnipeg, 28-52; Port Arthur, 28-40; Parry Sound, 34-40; Toronto, 38-50; Ottawa, 38-40; Montreal, 36-44; Quebec, 34-50; Halifax, 35-58.

Toronto, Oct. 15-1 a.m.—Probabilities—Lower Lakes—North and west winds; generally fair and cool, with frost at night.

Local Temperatures—The highest and lowest readings of the thermometer at the observatory on Friday, Oct. 14, were 48 and 44 degrees.

The Economist adds: "The career of the trading stamp in England is likely to be very much shorter than it was in the country, and to end with equal suddenness."

Case Against the Liberal M. P. P. for North Perth Dismissed With Costs.

London's Trial Stated for Nov. 23—Other Figures—Plebiscit Figures.

Stratford, Oct. 15.—The North and South Perth election cases came up for trial yesterday before Chancellor Boyd and Mr. Justice Meredith. The North Perth case was, on application of petitioner, at first adjourned until Wednesday next, but the petitioner declining to pay the cost of the day, as desired, their lordships dismissed the case with costs.

The South Perth case was adjourned until Nov. 11.

PLEBISCIT FIGURES.

Ottawa, Oct. 15.—The plebiscit returns are slow in coming in, and, according to the clerk of the court in chancery, the officials will not be available for some time to come.

From returns in the hands of the government, Quebec, with 17 places to hear from, gives a majority of 60,000, which is a majority of 60,000, with odd against prohibition. Ontario, with four places to hear from, gives a majority of 35,000 old in favor of prohibition. Only one return is in from Prince Edward Island, six are still out in Manitoba, none are in from British Columbia, and out of the seventeen places in Nova Scotia, nine are wanting.
