Sir George stated that he had sent out a letter to a limited number of citizens, who, he expected, would contribute generously, and so far the response had been very good. He had met a renewal of the kindness of London citizens, and he was confident that the city would not cheapen itself at this juncture, for it would be intolerable that at this time of crisis the people of Canada should fail the men in the trenches in need of every assistance of the Red Cross.

Large Attendance.

The meeting was held in the grillroom of the Tecumseh House, and was attended by almost every member of the committee. Team captains reported on the progress they had made, and in ten cases there was assurance that the teams would be complete. It was decided to appoint the same committee of men who acted in the patroctic fund campaign, in co-operation with the ladies, Col. Smith, and Messrs. Allan McLean, George S. Gibbons, C. Hunt, George Gunn and Magistrate Graydon. Rev. Dr. Waller reported that the appeal would haye the support of the city clergy, who have promised to make announncemets tomorrow.

Will Be Divided.

A. E. Silverwood, chairman of the canvass committee, outlined the plan that had been devised by Gordon Philip. There are 1,600 cards representing the persons the committee judged would be in a position to contribute substantial amounts, and these are to be divided among the teams. This time the arrangement is for the division of down-town cards, according to estimated donations, the remainder to be divided according to territories so as to prevent overlapping. The names of team members are to be in the secretary's hands by Monday noon, when the cards will all be ready. That afternoon the first list of subscribers will be published. Many Problems Will Be Solved by New Organization.

girls' work and leadership conference was manifested at the opening session ast evening for leaders by a good attendance and the spirit with which discussion of various phases of organized work for girls was taken up. The meeting was held in the Y. M. C. A. auditorium, the conference headquarters, Miss Georgina M. Newbury of the local committee presiding.

Miss Una Saunders of the national advisory committee for co-operation in girls' work, under the auspices of which the conference is being held, addressed the gathering, telling of the aims of the "teen age girl" movement, and explaining the program which has been prepared to meet the four-fold needs of girls, physical, intellectual, religious and social or service at the formative period

social or service at the formative period in their lives.

Will Supplement.

One point emphasized was that the new program is not intended to multiply organizations or careful to the control of the con new program is not intended to multiply organizations or overlap those all ready in existence; but rather to supplement them. The idea is to give a broader program and scope for activities to girls' clubs and other sociates already formed, and to help them in planning programs. Referring to the history of the national advisory committee for co-operation in girls' work, she stated that it had come into existence in recognition of the urgent need of some such development work in the right direction for girls, as already was being covered for boys by the Canadian standard efficiency tests program. At the present, however, the charting system for girls is not being advocated.




