

THREE VACANCIES TO BE FILLED IN THE UPPER HOUSE

Idea of Running Drayton in North Toronto Thought Abandoned.

OTTAWA, Aug. 20 .- There are three senatorial vacancies in eastern Ontario, created by the death of Senator Mc-cable. Laren of Perth, Senator Harry W. Laren of Perth, Senator Harry W. Richardson of Kingston, and Senator George Taylor of Gananoque, who in 1911 went to the Upper House to create a seat for Sir Thomas White.

It is anticipated that the first two vacancies may be filled at an early date. Lieut.-Col. Gerald White, former M. P. for North Renfrew, who last election, in his absence overseas, was ousted from nomination and failed to secure the candidature, is back home, and is expected to secure the Perth vacancy in the Senate. Both he and his father before him were staunch supporters of the old Conservative party. him were staunch supporters of the old Conservative party.

The idea of retiring Sir George Foster overseas and of running Sir Henry Drayton in North Toronto has, it is believed, been abandoned. One reason appears to be the present uncertain conditions of Toronto politics, another that it takes a long time to hold a byelection in a city seat. It is now believed that Dr. Edwards of Frontenac will go to the Senate to fill the Kingston vacancy, and that Sir Henry Drayton will run in Frontenac. The latter county is devoid of any centre, with 1,000 or more population. In such a seat a by-election could be arranged for in record time.

GOVERNMENT HAS BLUNDERED OR IS PLAYING POLITICS IN FIXING \$2.15 WHEAT PRICE

British Wheat Commission Decides To Pay \$1.55 To \$1.80—If Hundred Milli on Bushels Exported To Britain Loss Will Be \$35,000,000.

OTTAWA, Aug. 20.-News from London that the British wheat commission has fixed the price of Canadian wheat imports at from \$1.55 to \$1.80 per bushel has been received here with some consternation. On the strength apparently of advice from overseas the Government a week ago decided to fix the initial price for Canadian wheat at \$1.75 per bushel, guaranteeing the farmer this amount and undertaking to pay him the difference, if any, when marketed. Pressure, however, induced the Government to increase that amount, and it was announced that the initial guarantee would be \$2.15 per bushel.

That is two days ago. It was to be expected that the Government before making its decision would have communicated with the overseas authorities. But now comes the report, apparently authentic, that the British board has fixed the price of Canadian imported wheat at from \$1.55 to \$1.80 per bushel. Assuming that the Canadian exportation surplus will amount to a hundred million bushels, and that Great Britain will be the market, Canada has apparently guaranteed thirty-five million dollars more for the Canadian crop than it will bring in the market.

In the meantime, Sir George Foster declares that he will await for further

official advices before making any observations. On the face of it, however, it would appear that someone has either blundered, or is playing politics and incidentally planning bribery for votes.

NO OFFICIAL ADVICE. OTTAWA, Aug. 20.—No official notification has reached the department of trade and commerce of the fixing of prices to be paid for wheat imported to Great Britain by the British wheat commission. A London cable this morning said a maximum of \$1.80 per bushel for Canadian wheat had been decided on. This, with the fixed initial payment of \$2.15 to Canadian farmers by the wheat board of control, would mean a serious financial loss to be adjusted. It is expected that an official explanation will be forthcoming very shortly.



Fraudulent entry would be punishable by four years' imprisonment and \$1,000 fine, to be followed by deportation.

Few Exceptions. Few exceptions to the prohibition of immigration for two years are permitted by the bill Alien residents of the United States might send for their par-ents, grandparents, unmarried or widowed daughters, or sons under 16 years of age, unless these relatives had been alien enemies, for whom special authorization for admission would be r quired. Skilled labor also might be imported under existing law, and foreign officials, tourists, students and profes-sional men might come into the country temporarily under passports.

Adoption of the bill would mean, its framers say, literal fulfillment of the so-

framers say, literal fulfillment of the so-called "gentlemen's agreement" between the United States and Japan with re-spect to immigration, and would keep out Japanese coolies.

Representative Albert Johnson of Washington, chairman of the House immigration committee, in charge of the bill, says the requirement that aliens landing at American ports must have passports with a time limit will break up the great inflow of foreigners. Must Be Vised.

The bill provides that aliens coming The bill provides that aliens coming within exemption clauses of the present law must obtain passports from their agents of the United States and limited agents of the United states and limited as to time.

But the bill does not stop there.

Aliens who, under present laws are eligible to citizenship, would be permit-ted to come to the United States withont passports, providing they state is writing their belief hat they intend to reside here and become citizens. The reside here and become citizens. They must register at least once a year, failure to do so being a cause for deportation. Failure to take out first papers at the end of two years' residence also is cause for deportation. After taking out papers, aliens must remain here for final citzenship, with a time allowance off for knowledge of the elements of the American plan of more

elements of the American plan of gov-ernment and proficiency in the English language. If an alien does not acquire citizenship in eight years he is sent The committee hopes to provide a plan by which citizens of contiguous territory, Canada and Mexico, may visit the United States on cards issued


