WHAT PARLIAMENT HAS DONE DURING THE PAST MONTH

Ottawa, June 1 .- (By the Canadian Press) .- Parliament has completed its third month of session, and there is still much important business to be done. The last four weeks, however, have seen important developments. The Grand Trunk bill, keenly rought in its passage through the House, has received the royal assent and the temporary board of management has been ap-pointed. The franchise bill, after a total of seventeen days' considera-tion in committee, has not yet been reported, although it is not expected that the bill will now occupy the days or so. But of chief interest during the last month has been the

during the last month has been the return of the prime minister after a five months' holiday, and the presentation of the budget.

Chief criticism of the budget has centred on the "luxury" taxes, a new tax, ranging from 10 to 50 percent of the purchase price levied on certain articles when sold over a specified figure. Since the budget proposals were laid before the House a fortnight ago, communications and delegations have invaded the finance department like a flood: tions and delegations have invaded the finance department like a flood; and the budget debate, with its al-ternating criticism and praise, still wanders along in the House. The wanders along in the House. The alm of the luxury taxes, as Sir Henry Drayton has explained, is to achieve one of two objects—either to bring down the cost of living or to produce revenue. The luxury taxes are already in force, but how far they have reduced prices, if at all its part yet annarent. all, is not yet apparent.

In his speech also Sir Henry announced a "thorough revision of the tariff," and laid down the general lines which the revision would follow. The Opposition wished to go further. Hon. W. S. Fielding submitted an amendment, still under consideration by the House, that pending a wider revision of the tariff substantial reductions should be made in the customs taxation. be made in the customs taxation, with a view to reduction in the high cost of living, and, secondly, to reduce the cost of the instruments of production. No doubt is felt that the amendment will be defeated.

Close Divisions.

The month was marked by a remarkably close division on an Important question of Government policy. Announcement had been made of an agreement with the governments of the United Kingdom and of the United States for the appointment of a Canadian minister plenipotentiary at Washington. Mr. Fielding had raised the whole question on an amendment to a motion to go into supply, an amendment requiring production of all correspondence before arrangements for the appointment of a Canadian representative were consummated. Debate came on a Monday. Many members were away. The day. Many members were away. The Government carried its motion on a mere majority of five. It was a "snap" vote, but the Opposition were jubilant, and there has been heart-burning on the Government side since.

Practically no supply was voted during the month. The great bulk of the estimates still remain to be passed. Third reading was given to the bill extending the time limit for manufacture and sale of oleomargarine and a bill to amend the industrial disputes in investigation act. Both bills aroused considerable debate. Among legislation still to be considered is a bill introduced by the minister of justice on Friday last. It seeks to amend the criminal last. It seeks to amend the criminal code, and among other things deals with racetrack betting.

Taken altogether, there is every indication that the session will last until the end of June.

SUPREME COURT JUDGES EQUALLY DIVIDED IN OPINIONS CONCERNING BOARD OF COMMERCE

Three Uphold Jurisdiction of Board, While the Remaining Three Maintain Specially Appointed Government Body Did Not Have Power It Claimed—Fate of the Board Depends On Whether or Not New Legislation Defining Its Status Is Brought Down—In Meantime the Reconstruction Planned Must Be Deferred.

[Special to The Advertiser.]
Ottawa, June 1.—The findings of the Supreme Court of Canada in the reference regarding the jurisdiction of the board of commerce leave the whole vexed question unsettled. The court has divided equally on the matter at issue, Chief Justice Sir Louis Davies and Messrs. Justices Anglin and Migneault upholding the jurisdiction and authority of the board, while Messrs. Justices Iddington. Duff and Bordeur are on the other side.

The situation is now quite uncertain, and it will be for the Government to decide what is next to be done. It had been anticipated that the court would clear the matter up once and for all, and that the Government would be in a position to act accordingly. The board at the present time lacks a head, and reconstruction has been postponed pending the bringing down of the court's ruling. Now confusion once more reigns supreme.
