IMPROVEMENT GRADUAL IN ATHLETIC RECORDS

Meredith's New Half Mile

Mark and Simpson's Fast
Time Over High Hurdles
May Be Beginning of New
Series of Standards.

Altho changes have been few and improvement gradual in athletic records since the formation of the Amateur Alilotic Union in 1888, it is probable that the year 1916 will see more record smashing performences than any twelvementh in the past with the single exception of 1896, which was a wonder year in athletics.

Already new marks have been established for two of the thirteen standard events and with the big competitions of the season yet to be decided it is not improbable that more of the marks at present on the books will go by the boards.

The new records of the still-young athletic season are the half-mile mark of 1 minute 52 1-5 seconds set by Ted Meredith in the Pennsylvania-Cornell dual meet in May, and the record of 14 3-5 seconds in the 120-yard high hurdles established by Bob Simpson of the University of Miscouri in the Missouri Valley and Western conference meets.

Despite Meredith's wonderful perform-

Despite Meredith's wonderful performance his record is just a trifle more than three seconds better than the mark of 1 minute 55 2-5 seconds, made by Lon Myers back in 1885. This illustrates how gradual has been the improvement in running this distance. Myers' record was on the books for ten years until it fell before the assault of Charley Fitzpatrick, who ran the half in 1 minute 53 2-5 seconds in 1895. This mark was not equaled until 1914, when Dave Caldwell of Cornell covered the distance in the same time. Meredith's record may be as long starding as Fitzpatrick's wis. Viewed in the light of past records, Simpson's new hurdle record is not so startling, altho it is a full two-fifths of a second under the old mark of 15 seconds, which was made by Fred Kelly of California in 1913, and equaled by him in 1915.

H. L. Williams is credited with the first hurdles record. This was 15 4-5 seconds, and was made in 1891. S. Chase brought this down to 15 2-5 seconds in 1895, and three years later Alvin Kraenzlein reduced it another fifth of a second. Kraenzlein's record was equaled by A. B. Shaw in 1908, by W. A. Edwards in 1908, and by J. P. Nicholson in 1912. Then came Kelly and his record of 15 seconds, which was equaled by Fred Murray of Stanford and Earl Thompson of Southern California before Simpson moved it downward two pegs.



LARGEST TELESCOPE.

In The American Magazine, Merre Crowell says:

"Several years ago the Canadian Government decided that it wanted the argest telescope in the world to be set upin the clear air of Vancouver for phophing thousands of stars that had never been photographed before—stars almost inconceivably distant. Light travels at the rate of about 180,000 miles a second; yet some of the star light to be snared by the Vancouver instrument has been speeding thru space for perhaps 1,000,000 years since it left home.

"Of course the job was given to Breshear. A gigantic parabolic mirror—the elargest ever made in one piece—was east in France. It weighed in the rough 4968 pounds and was 73 inches in diameter. Nearly 400 pounds of glass had been taken from that lens when I saw it in Dr. Brashear's shop, where it is kept in an underground chamber, protected from all air currents. When it completed and mounted, the telescope will weigh more than 500 tons."
