Steamer Governor Cobb, Captain Pike, landed 33 passengers and 127 tons of freight from Boston last night, and sailed on her return trip this morning.

A rummage sale will be held in the Every Day Club hall on Friday afternoon next, the proceeds to go for fitting up the grounds on the Marsh road for a playground for the children. The hall will be open this afternoon and tomorrow afternoon to receive donations.

Stephen Spears, a colored man, is reported by patrolman Ward for profanity on Duke street last night. He will be summoned to appear in court on Friday, when John Alward, who is reported for permitting wood to drop from his team on Main street, will also be present.

"Our Canadian Heritage and Responsibility" will be the title of an address to be given by Rev. Dr. G. M. Campbell tomorrow evening in the school room of Carlton Methodist church. The entertainment will be known as Canadian night, and musical and literary selections of a patriotic nature will be given.

The river steamers are bringing down a large amount of potatoes late. "Some men" is also coming to the front. The steamer arrived at 1:30 with one of the largest cargoes of the season, consisting of potatoes, hides and veal. NEWS FROM FREDERICTON

A Dynamite Accident May Cost Molly Mahoney His Sight—A Wedding

Fredericton, N. B., May 5.—(Special).—Molly Mahoney, of Magalloway, met with a serious accident near Grand Falls last week, and it is feared will lose his eyesight. He was working with a crew of men who were attempting to dislodge an ice jam with dynamite. The charge had been ignited and had failed to explode. Mahoney started to investigate and a stick of dynamite, which he picked up, exploded in his hands. He was thrown a short distance by the shock and badly cut about the head, and he is now being treated by a St. John specialist, who does not hold out much hope of saving his eyesight.

One of the three soldiers awaiting trial by court martial recently made an unsuccessful attempt to escape from the barracks guard room. He cut a hole in the stone wall of his cell and would certainly have got away had the guard discovered and frustrated the scheme.

The pupils of Percy A. Guthrie, of the firm of Cromack & Guthrie, barristers, and Miss Margaret McMurtrie, were celebrated at St. Ann's church this afternoon in the presence of a number of relatives and friends. Rev. Craig Nichols was the officiating clergyman.

Miss Isabelle McMurtrie, the bride's sister, was bridesmaid, and Wm. A. Doherty acted as best man. The happy couple received many handsome presents. The South African Veterans and the Young Men's Conservative club being among those to contribute. They are to leave this evening on a trip to the Upper Provinces.

The water in the river rose two inches last night. There is a good run of logs at the booms, and bank logs are arriving at Springhill from the South and Dufferin. Contractor Scott started work on the corporation drive this morning at Aroostook.

MANASSAH'S VISITOR REFUSED TO DEPART

Police Called to Eject Sarah Lobb From Manassah Hogan's Residence—Took the Lady to Court

In the police court this morning Sarah Lobb, aged 20, pleaded not guilty to being unable to satisfactorily explain her presence on Prince street, west end, at half past eleven o'clock last night, and Patrolman Marshall was sworn. He stated that he had seen Lobb in the company of Manassah Hogan, of the Ethiopian race, with his habitation on Watson street. The Lobb woman, according to Hogan, sought accommodation at his domicile on Sunday night, after the ferry had ceased to ply, and the cars had terminated their trips in view of the circumstances he gratified her desire, and thus obtained a go-as-you-please midnight constitutional around the bridge. When Monday morning dawned she had absconded herself into membership in the family, and persisted in lingering at Manassah's fireside.

Last night Manassah resorted to stringent measures, however, and at his request the girl was unceremoniously led to the street with the admonition to vanish as rapidly as possible from the precincts. As her feet were the sole means of locomotion she was deemed advisable to take her into custody. She informed the policeman that Parker Hogan, another colored man, escorted her to the Hogan abode on Sunday night.

Marshall alleged that she was a habitual street walker, with a specialty for colored folks. Until two weeks ago she was a guest at several houses at the Courtenay Bay extremity of Duke street, familiarly designated Blood Alley. She has been seen frequently enjoying moonlight and even daylight strolls with impromptu negro acquaintances. The Duke street abodes in which she was the guest of honor are the scenes of numerous drunken brawls and the doors are always locked. The girl was remanded and a term in jail is contemplated, unless it is possible to confine her in a home.

Frank Danaher, aged 39, pleaded guilty to addressing his mother in opprobrious terms in her home last night, but said he did not recollect threatening her life, as he had been imbibing for some weeks. He was also remanded.

James Beers, an emancipated sixty-five year old man, admitted that the number of beers he assimilated had unsteadied his legs, and wrought his present feeble state. He said he took French leave of the Municipal Home two weeks ago, in order to gratify his appetite for liquor. He agreed to return to the institution, and was fined \$4 or ten days, which was subsequently suspended.

William Bradley was fined \$4.

Further hearing of the information against William Daley, a hackman, reported for trespassing beyond the cabmen's allotted stand at the depot was again postponed until Friday morning.

A foreigner, who was taken into custody on Monday night for inebriation, and was adjudged to be John Roop, an Austrian, by the police, proved to be an Italian with a name akin to a sneeze; \$2 was deducted from his \$24.00.
