### MAKES STATEMENT OF ITALY'S AIMS IN WAR

Baron Sennino Also Makes a Call Upon His Countrymen for Best Sustained Effect

Rome, June 22—Baron Sonnino, Italian foreign minister, addressing the Chamber of Deputies today, declared that Italy's war aims were to seek liberty and assurance for Italy and other countries, but that Italy did not aspire to frontiers but that Italy did not aspire to frontiers constituting a menace to a neighboring state or danger to anyone, simply such as would be a bulwark guaranteeing the independence of a pacific country."

Weigh the fruit and heat slowly in a preserving kettle to extract the juice. Do not cook more than three or four pounds at a time; for best results an even smaller quantity. Cherries which show signs of knots or worms must be carefully stoned. Cook for twenty minutes in their own juice with the addition of just a little water at the start. 
