So Kelly applied the name Charley horse to a strained muscle.—New York Sun.

MORNING NOTES OF THE WAR

The U-29, one of the newest and swiftest type of German submarines had been working in the English channel and off the Selby Islands and has done heavy damage to British merchant pedoled seven steamers, three of which escaped partly damaged. Two others were officially reported sunk, the collier Onvergyre and the steamer Indian City, from Galveston, Texas, while it is unofficially reported that the steamers Florissant, and the Andalusian have been sunk.

The Admiralty announced on Saturday that, up to March 10, eighty-eight British steamers, merchant and fishing vessels, had been sunk or captured. Some 5,000 German prisoners were in Have on Saturday being taken to England, as the result of land fighting which more than offsets the German submarine successes.
