


Finding of Court of Inquiry in London Announced—Disaster Caused by German Submarine--Captain and Steamer **Owners Blameless**

London, July 17--- "Torpedoes fired by a submarine of German nationality," caused the loss of the steamship Lusitania and its passengers, according to the indings of a court of inquiry appointed to investigate the disaster.

The court held that no blame attached either to Captain Turner,

mander of the vessell, or the Cunard line, the owners. "After having carefully inquired into the circumstances of the disaster," says the formal report, "the court finds the loss of said ship and lives was due to damage caused the ship by torpedoes fired by a submarine of German

"In the opinion of the court, the act was done, not merely with the inten tion of sinking the ship, but also with the intention of destroying the lives of the people aboard."






