BEGIN AT ONCE
FOR SCHOONER
RACE NEXT YEAR

Designs of Vessel Being
Drawn in Halifax

Conference yesterday Decided
to Start Building About
December 1—Lunenburg
Vessel Gets Home Battered.

Lunenburg, N. S., Nov. 16.—The
Zwicker schooner Lloyd George, Captain
Himmelman, is home in a battered
condition after her longest West Indian
trip. The vessel, out of Porto Rico with
fish, and a passage of fifty-one days. She
arrived with her main boom smashed in
two places, her masts gone, and her
breast and topsail badly torn. Lack of
wind and for a time too much of it were
responsible for her slow voyage. The
Lloyd George is rated as one of the fast-
est working schooners out of Lunenburg.
Halifax, N. S., Nov. 16.—Designs are
being drawn in Halifax by W. J. Howe,
members of the Halifax sailing commit-
tee, for a semi-knockout fishing schooner
to be built at Lunenburg this winter,
which it is hoped will bring back to
Nova Scotia and to Canada the cham-
pionship of the North Atlantic fishing
fleet.

The decision to build a schooner was
reached yesterday afternoon at a confer-
ence by G. A. Rhinland, designer of the
Delawana, A. J. Walters, G. C. Walters,
and C. Heron of Lunenburg, and the
Halifax sailing committee.

Lunenburg and Halifax interests are
behind the builders of the schooner, and
it is expected that upwards of half the
hulls will be owned in Halifax. Work
on the new vessel, which is expected
will be built in the yards of Smith &
Rhinland, Lunenburg, will be started on
Dec. 1, and she will be ready for the
water in the latter part of February or
early in March. She will spend the fall
1921 season on the fishing grounds, thus
qualifying for entry in the international
contest.

ANZIG NOW
A FREE CITY

Berlin, Nov. 16.—Formal proclama-
tion of Danzig and the surrounding ter-
ritory as a free city was made yesterday
by the German government. The new
constituent assembly at Danzig by

of Danzig in the absence of Sir Reginald
