The care of fish is a fine art in Norway, and an interesting tale of the fishing industry was recently related in the Food Board offices by Meinert A. Wick, a Norwegian now resident on the Gaspe coast, Que.

In every telegraph office in Norway, he declares, a daily bulletin is posted showing where fish are running, the depth at which caught, the bait used, the size of the nets and any other information of value to commercial fishermen. Furthermore, inspectors see to it that all fish taken is properly handled.

Pay more attention to your household shopping. Cultivate the market and encourage your dealer to handle substitutes; display food posters, and otherwise help along the cause of conservation.

### SIFT ASHES AND SAVE COAL.

N. Y. Fuel Administration Sends Out an Appeal to Women.

The New York State Fuel Administration has sent out an appeal to women to conserve coal by sifting to it that the fires in the kitchen ranges, in heating stoves, and in furnaces be run just as economically as possible.

"There is a wasteful and there is an economical way of minding the fire in the kitchen or in the cellar," said Governor P. Moseley, chief of conservation, yesterday, "but the latter way is the only one that the household can follow. If furnace fires are carefully banked at night, one-quarter of a ton of coal may be saved in every household every month. That saving reduces the individual coal bills and helps win the war."

"The same thing may be done with such kitchen fires as are burned all night. And then, when grates are dumped, let the ashes be sifted, and coal that is only partly burned be picked out and saved to be burned again. There is no city in the world that is more dependent upon coal than New York, and there is nothing the government needs more. Sift the ashes and save the coal ought to be a winter slogan for every woman who keeps house."

**GERMANS MAKE BREAD FROM LUPINE PLANT.**

Amsterdam, Sept. 2.—(Associated Press Correspondence)—Germany is threatened with a new war food called lupine bread. To work a process for converting the lupine, a leguminous plant into food for man and beast on a large scale a company has been formed at Chemnitz, Saxony, with a capital of 8,000,000 marks.

The lupine was held in no particular esteem until about fifty years ago, when a German chemist discovered a process by which the bitter taste of the plant was eliminated and the vegetable fat and albumen which it contains were made serviceable for human consumption. Now a German food expert has taken up and perfected the old recipe. It is said that lupine meal makes quite a palatable and wholesome "bread," while the refuse is excellent food for cattle. The German government, it is announced, is about to take the lupine cultivation under its official wing.
