The first shipment to Boston was made about Christmas time when approximately 150 ten gallon cans were shipped on the Boston boat. This ship- ment has increased each week since the first was made and this week no fewer than 400 cans were loaded on the Calvin Austin. This means that 4,000 gallons are being deducted from the local supply each week which at the retail price of eight cents a quart would amount to nearly \$1,800 worth of milk. It is understood that the company in- tends building in Celebration street a cold storage warehouse. There is no duty on milk going into the United States and it sells for ten cents a quart in the Boston market.
