**TIM HEALY, M. P., IN TORONTO**

Speaks of Overseas Support as Doing Much in England

Toronto, Ont., Oct. 10.—Timothy M. Healy, K. C., M. P., the Nationalist member for Northeast Cork in the British House of Commons, who is spending a few days in Toronto on private business in an interview said:

"Partyism is dead in England, with the one exception of the feeling which has been created among the Unionists by the recent formal passing of the home rule bill and the Welsh Church bill." The present united condition of Ireland and the spectacle of its union at the time of war was declared Mr. Healy described as "the pleasant incident which I have ever witnessed during my lifetime."

"The feeling in Britain over the war" said Mr. Healy, "has developed into a quiet determination to go through with the present crisis at any cost. And I may add that the support that has been given by the overseas dominions has done much to arouse that feeling of solid determination as the obligation of partyism in England itself. It was pleasant indeed," he continued, "to find feeling in New York and American sentiment as a whole so favorable to Britain's cause."

**KITCHENER'S WORK**

England Has Done Remarkably in Raising New Armies

It is only about eight weeks since Lord Kitchener took charge of the War Office, and he has accomplished some remarkable work. Canada has had in the dispatch of her expeditionary force of rather more than one division, some idea of what an undertaking and fitting out of an army is. Some paragraphs from a recent issue of London Truth give some idea of what the mother country, under Lord Kitchener's guidance, has been doing.

The army council have completed the framework of the new army organization, says Truth, and this is how they have done it. The 6th Division has at last gone abroad, leaving Sir John Jellicoe to take care of invasion. Thus two divisions, the 7th and 8th, are being formed out of regular troops unallotted to Sir John French's six divisions, together with the units which have been brought home from South Africa and the Mediterranean. When the artillery and transports for these two divisions are ready the field marshal will have a fourth army corps under his command, the 8th corps and a third cavalry division being on their way, if they have not already joined him, from India. Judged by the quantity alone, to say nothing of quality, this force of 200,000 men hardly answers the German Emperor's description of a "contemptible little army."

Now about the new armies. The army council have got some half a million or more recruits of the best raw material to play and this is what they have done with them. Six divisions were organized on August 21, six more on September 11, and another six on September 18—eighteen divisions in all. Here we have the frame work of three new expeditionary forces amounting in round numbers to 800,000 officers and men, with another 150,000 more remaining at training centres to replace casualties. As Lord Kitchener pointed out, men are easier to get than arms, ammunition or equipment, but the new war minister has plenty of driving power in his nature, and he is making the best of it now. The spring will soon come round, and in addition to these three new divisions armies is the prospect of a fourth army, which is to be formed out of reserve battalions created when the expeditionary force embarked for foreign service, these battalions being brought up to war strength by new recruits. This will give us another 400,000 officers and men, who are increased by the Indian contingent. As this figure does not include colonial, territorial or the local corps now in the field, it is safe to say that within a year or less we shall have an army in the field amounting to a million of men, with plenty more behind them.

When the six states of Australia federated and became a commonwealth in 1901 the total population was only 8,824,018. In 1910 it had reached 4,788,229 an increase of 908,446.

Australian meat export figures continue to show abnormal expansion. During 1910 shipments of beef, mutton, lined meats and rabbits were worth £7,180,000, compared with £4,186,000 in 1912.
