HAD A ROUGH TIME

City Youth Who Went Lumbering Has Experience He Will Not Forget

After three days of hardships during which he was, for the greater part of the time, without food, having spent one night in the woods without shelter from the chilling rain, and another in a freight car, a young man who was a member of a friend's home recovering from the effects of his experience.

He was engaged with eleven others to work in a lumber camp in Charlotte County. They were driven to the woods, twenty-five miles from St. George, and set to work swamping and preparing lumber rafts. They found the work different from what they had expected and by noon on the first day five of them decided to leave and set out to walk to St. George. The one about whom this is written held on a little longer, but later in the afternoon he also threw up the job and started for the railway. Night overtook him before he had reached his destination and in the darkness he lost his way in the woods.

It had commenced to rain and he was chilled through, but, as he was afraid of getting further away from the track, he had to remain where he was. He tried to get some sleep as he was nearly exhausted. The next morning, tired and hungry, he continued his journey and towards midnight struck the railway tracks, as he could find no other shelter he crawled into a box car on a siding. He was not strong enough to even close the door and spent another most uncomfortable night.

During the day his feet had become so swollen that he was forced to take one of his boots and had hobbled the rest of the distance with one foot bare. His only food was some berries which he had found. On the third day he continued his painful tramp, but could make but low progress. Towards evening he reached a farm house where he was hospitably received and given his supper and shelter for the night.

Starting the next morning towards the city, still hobbling on his lacerated feet, he was overtaken near Musquash by a stivvie man, who picked him up and "rove him the rest of the way to the city, when they reached Fairville the good man exchanged the express wagon which he had been driving for a carriage and conveyed the young man to the one of his friends where he is still in bed recovering from the results of his hardships.

NORTON MAN IS ASPHYXIATED

Chas. A. Spencer Dead in Lowell—Was Former Councillor in Massachusetts

A special despatch to The Times from Boston says:

"Former Councillor Charles Albert Spencer of Lowell, was asphyxiated by gas accidentally in his office between Thursday and Friday. He was born in Norton, N. B., fifty-three years ago."

SENTENCED FOR BEATING HIS WIFE

Louis Gallagher Fined \$20 or Two Months—Liquor Case Arises Out of Court Matter

In the session of the police court this morning Arthur Murphy, David Higgins, and James McDonough were each fined \$8 or twenty days in jail, and George Hansen, a sailor, \$4 or ten days in jail on a like charge of drunkenness.

McDonough asked the magistrate for a chance to leave the town, but the court's reply was "This is not a chance and you will have to go to jail."

Louis Gallagher, charged with beating his wife, pleaded that it was an "aggravated assault," meaning that his wife was responsible. Mrs. Gallagher, however, said that her husband had been ill-treating her for more than a year and that he had threatened, on several occasions, to take her life. He was fined \$20 or two months in jail.

In sentencing the prisoner, the court remarked that he ought to be ashamed of himself. "Any man that will beat a woman is no good. When you get out, if you want to fight, try it on with a man your own size and see what you will get."

Walter Axell charged with vagrancy, and Arnold Reid, charged with stealing a mouth organ and twenty cents from Miss Gene Millings in Carmarthen street were both remanded. Axell said that he had no home and that he had been sleeping in cars for some time.

Henry Dolan, reported for selling liquor to George Hansen, one of today's prisoners, pleaded not guilty. Policeman McLeod said of seeing Hansen and two other men going into the shop in Union street and seeing them with a bottle on the counter. He arrested Hansen after he came out of the bar. According to the witness the man was drunk before he went into the shop.

Charles Johnson and August Lovstrom, charged with Hansen at the time, said that they were served with whiskey in Don's. Lovstrom said that Hansen was not drunk at the time but had been drinking. The defendant took the stand and said that the three men had obtained lager beer in his store, but no whiskey. None of them appeared to be drunk. Daniel Gullin, K. C., appeared for the defence. The case was adjourned until Monday afternoon at 2:30 o'clock.

THE CITY AND COUNTY UNDER COMMISSION

Councillor Cochrane's Views on Solution of Problem of Fair Representation for Each

Discussing the relations between St. John city and county after the city has adopted the commission plan of government, Councillor Cochrane of St. Martins, in an interview in the North Shore Leader, said he considered that to work a solution of the situation and to give both city and county fair representation it would be expedient to take a plebiscite on the county on the advisability of adopting the commission form of government having then one councillor from each parish. This should facilitate the work at the board as there appeared to be too large a representation at the present time.

Coun. Cochrane said another way to surmount the difficulty, Legislation could reduce the representation to one councillor each from the four parishes. Failing in either of these two methods of proceeding, in Coun. Cochrane's opinion, that the city would force the county into a separate municipality.

BOYS IN COURT

Several Cases in Which Juniors Were Asked to Face Judge

A rather lengthy session of the juvenile court was held by Judge Ritchie in the police court this morning. The first three called were Ernest Lake, Norman Ward and Percy Toole, charged with discharging firearms on the railway track at the foot of Union street. Toole did not appear and the case was set aside in order to have him present. Later on, it was resumed and the boys were allowed to go with a caution.

Samuel Cook, Joseph Brady and Robert and John Cook were charged with beating a little girl named Mary McMenamin. According to the stories of the boys, Brady was the chief offender and the other three were allowed to go. Mrs. Brady was told that she would have to pay some portion of a \$20 fine for the boy, and in the meantime he was sent home.

Ernest Earle, reported for selling newspapers in front of the Union depot, contrary to law, was also cautioned and allowed to go.

Gordon Livingston, reported for throwing stones in Hillyard street, did not appear and the case was set aside until Saturday next.

George Stealy has been reported for throwing stones in Union street, West Side and will come before the court next Saturday also.


