Montreal, Nov. 13—Although the earnings of the C. P. R. are still under the disadvantage of having to meet reduced western wheat traffic as compared with last year, they are showing heavy weekly increases. For the week ended, November 7, the gross earnings of the C. P. R. were 82,267,000, as against \$2,113,000 during the same period last year, an increase of \$154, 500.

DON'T FEED A COLD!

markable Prediction — Save Coal Supply

London, Nov. 13—President Ferranti, of the Institution of Electrical Engineers, lecturing here, predicted maryelous developments in electricity. Having explained a scheme for a universal supply of electricity was understood more fully it would probably control the weather, producing or preventing rainfall when and where it was wished. All things now achieved by coal could be better done by electricity, consequently all coal should be converted into electricity at a few big centres and retailed from them. This would save annually ninety million tons of coal, while the by-products of conversion would give enough ammonium sulphate to fertilize all the cultivated land in England.


