

ANNUAL REPORTS SHOW GOOD YEAR

**German Street Baptist
Church Work of 1925
Reviewed**

**Finances and Other Matters—
Officers for Present Year
Are Chosen**

Reports presented at the annual meeting of the German street Baptist church last night, showed that the year had been one of exceptional success and progress for all the church activities and organizations. Rev. Dr. S. S. Poole, pastor, presided at the meeting.

The treasurer reported total receipts of \$18,239 and returns from the every member canvass launched on New Year's Day, 1925, showed 41 new subscribers enrolled and the total of subscribers, 373 was a gain of 18 over the previous year. The choir was reported in a flourishing condition.

The Willing Workers gave a very satisfactory report of their work and the Philanthropic class report showed that organization had raised \$105 for missions.

S. S. HAS BIG YEAR.

The Sunday school reported a very successful year with 550 members enrolled and \$1,321.75 raised during the year. The Women's Missionary Society raised \$1,014.13. The trustee board reported extensive repairs had been made in church property at a cost of \$950.

The nominating committee's report was adopted and included two new committees, the building committee and publicity committee.

Among those elected were the following: Church clerk, Philip McA. Simms; treasurer, E. Clinton Brown; church accountant, Emery A. Titus.

WHITE PLAINS, N. Y., Jan. 12.—It was reported on good authority that Leonard Kip Rhinelander, who lost the suit to annul his marriage to Alice Beatrice Jones Rhinelander on the ground she failed to tell him she was

a quadroon, had gone to Connecticut to establish a residence so he could sue for a divorce. In Connecticut it is necessary to establish a residence for one year before a divorce action.

Lee Parsons Davis, counsel for Mrs. Rhinelander, said it would make no difference if Rhinelander had gone out of the state, as Mrs. Rhinelander's action for a separation on the ground of abandonment could be brought by serving him by publication. Mrs. Rhinelander declined to discuss her husband, saying it didn't make much difference to her where he was, as he had to pay her alimony just the same. The motion of Mrs. Rhinelander for additional alimony and counsel fees will not be argued until about March 1.

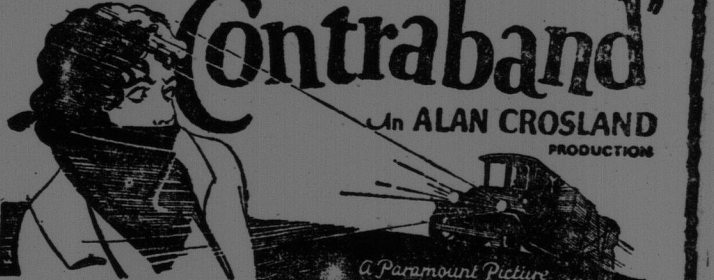
