When the balloon was released it rapidly soared upward amid the cheers of the crowd. A crossbar was attached to the balloon, and it was the intention of the couple to give a trapeze performance, and afterward to descend by means of a parachute.

After the balloon had risen a short distance it was caught in a current of air and struck a telegraph pole. The couple were sitting on the bar, and when the balloon struck the pole the bar swayed to and fro in a frightful manner. Miss Devoy, thinking it would be safer to drop from the bar rather than be thrown from it, lowered herself by her hands, hung for a moment, and then let go. The height from which she dropped was not great, and she landed on the ground unhurt. Released from her weight, the balloon swung upward, and as it did so, Higgins, who still retained his place on the bar, became entangled in the telegraph wires, and in a flash he was swept off the bar and fell, twisting and turning, upon a fence, receiving such terrible injuries that he died, after sufficiency.


