HE LIVED A DOUBLE LIFE.

Eved Religion's Clerk to Cover His Sin.

A despatch from Berlin says, the criminal court in Oldenburg has condemned the Lutheran pastor, Muller, to 14 years' hard labor for embezzlement, obtaining money by false pretences and forgery.

The trial has been one of the most notable in recent years. More than 50 witnesses were summoned to testify to the facts of the case against the pastor whose case was complete without them.

It was shown at the trial that Muller began swindling his parishioners as soon as he settled in a village near Oldenburg several years ago, and that he had continued the practice without interruption until fear of exposure compelled him to flee. He told the peasants that he could invest money for them at a large rate of interest in Berlin, and more than 100 of the petty landowners and shopkeepers entrusted to him sums varying between 1,000 and 1,500 marks on representation that the Roman Catholics were about to buy it. He collected the purchase price, but paid only \$10,000 to the seller, saying that the rest would be paid in instalments. As secretary of the church council in Oldenburg the councillors testified he manufactured and incorporated in the records of the meeting resolutions authorizing him to collect large sums. He made the collections, but spent the money in wild living in Berlin, during his occasional visits to the city. Altogether he obtained about 350,000 marks. The constable who arrested him testified that Muller, after his flight and before his arrest, spent thousands on fast women, posing as a wealthy horsebreeder and when caught, was sitting in a tavern with but four marks left, discussing the enormity of his own crimes as related by the newspapers.

In pronouncing sentence the judge said that in his whole experience on the bench he had not seen an another such abandoned scoundrel as the prisoner.

Des Moines, Iowa, April 21.—David Cookman, a farmer, living 5 miles north east of this city, killed his wife and an unknown man at his home last night.

A very accommodating sort of murderer is John Smith of Wolfe county. Saturday he killed Mr. H. Reynolds, and after he had dug the grave and assisted the neighbors in the interment.

Michael Norris died at his home, East Third street, South Boston, Thursday morning in the 102 year of his age. He was a native of county Cork, Ireland. He leaves six sons and six daughters.

Some 2,000 Chinamen are distributed along the Washington, Idaho and Montana lines, awaiting the expiration of the exclusion law on May 4th, in order to cross into the United States from British Columbia.

Advices by steamship state that the Comptroller of Hong Kong and Shanghai Bank has absconded. Loss \$600,000. Four native banks have stopped payment; liabilities one million and a half dollars.

A pouch containing £20,000 in checks, drafts and other papers was stolen from a mail wagon on its way to the Northern Pacific depot at St. Cloud, Minn., on Thursday.

They were remittances to eastern banks.

Several outrages attributed to anarchists, are reported from Madrid. The bridge in Herrera de Rio Pisuerga, Castile, was completely destroyed by a dynamite explosion. Public property in the town of Ormaiztegui, in Galicia and at Ergotia, was also damaged in a similar manner.
