COMMEMORATIVE MEDAL—Major Benson has received from London a very handsome silver commemorative medal. It is about three inches diameter and has, on one side, the usual representation in relief of Her Majesty, and the inscription "Victoria Dei Gra. Brit. Regina Fid. Def. Ed. Imp. Commemorative Medal. Ann. Regis. MDCCCXCVII." and on the other, the British coat of arms in the upper corner, and at the bottom a circular shield, in the center of which four hands are clasped and in the four quarters which are formed by the extended arms are the words, "Peace, Love and Union." There is a striking border composed of fifty-five shields, each of which bears the name of one of the British Colonies or Provinces, and the words "The British Empire" are placed prominently across the face of the medal.

A Great Marksmen.

"An election of a seat in the city council by the local government, does not appear to have been the least of the duties of the late Mr. R. A. R. train for Yarmouth. When near Meteghan the train suddenly plunged into a flock of sheep on the road, before brakes could be put on. The sheep scattered right and left, but one little lamb was caught and cut in two, the whole train passing over it. Its mother was seen to return, on a run, to the track and stand over the little corpse, bleating piteously and then, as the train went on, she left her dead lamb and ran madly after the train as though imploring aid, till she was lost to sight around a bend in the road. "Our Dumb Animal," tells how a few months ago a New England farmer slaughtered a calf within sight of his mother, a valiant and intelligent jersey. The cow manifested every sign of human distress at the sight, and within an hour or two committed suicide by deliberately walking into an adjacent pond. The affection of many species of animals for their young is more than human, so is their gratitude and so is their contempt. We wrong the brute when we call a man who tortments them needlessly brutal.

The Cost of Raising Horses.

It is seldom that we can get any reliable data in reference to the matter in very few instances do parties ever go to the trouble of weighing the food given and of keeping an accurate account of the value of the food involved. We did an experiment in the case of Mr. Robert Forrest of Elms, Ont., who has recently made public the result of an estimate of the cost of raising a heavy draught gelding to the age of three years. We give the items for each year. Although some exceptions may be taken to them, they are both interesting and instructive, and are, on the whole, fairly drawn. The following are the figures, as estimated by Mr. Forrest, for the first year's outfit: Service fees, ten dollars; cost of mare one month before and for a similar period after foaling, three dollars—this sum is intended to pay for her pasture. The first winter there was fed fifteen hundred pounds of hay, which, at eight dollars per ton, amounts to six dollars; also ten bushels of oats, which, at thirty cents per bushel, amounts to three dollars; three bushels of carrots, at fifteen cents, forty-five cents; attendance, including feeding, cleaning and watering, six dollars; rent of one-half box stall, and of loft room for hay, two dollars; incidentals, two dollars, total cost at year one, forty-five dollars. For the second year the items were: Six months pasture, at one dollar per month, six dollars; winter food, one and a quarter tons of hay, ten dollars, and sixteen bushels of oats, four dollars and eighty cents; carrots, four bushels, sixty cents; cleaning and attendance, six dollars; rent of one-half box stall, and of loft room for hay, two dollars and fifty cents; interest of money on the first year's cost at six per cent, two dollars and fifty cents; total cost for the second year, thirty-eight dollars and thirty cents. For the third year the items were: Pasture for six months, at a dollar per month, six dollars; winter food, one and a half tons, twelve dollars; oats, twenty-two bushels, six dollars and sixty cents; five bushels of carrots, seventy-five cents; attendance, six dollars; rent of stall and loft room, three dollars and fifty cents; interest on cost at the end of the second year, four dollars and seventy-five cents; total cost for the third year, forty-five dollars and fifty cents, and for the three years, a hundred and thirty-three dollars and thirty cents. Some of the items that Mr. Forrest were slightly higher than those given, particularly those relating to interest.

In commemoration of the QUEEN'S JUBILEE, I will now list the remainder of my choice stock of flowers, and other goods.

AT A LARGE DISCOUNT.

The ladies who have not yet procured their mid-summer millinery will do well to call at the Bouquet and secure good.

It may be that some of the items are

charged a little too high, as insurance and rent charges, but, on the other hand, some of them are low, as, for instance, the price put upon the oats. The charge for attendance is but three cents per day for winter, with a small fee also for summer, and this is not too much, all things considered. It is to be borne in mind that the estimate for the food was the exact amount eaten by the colt, so far as quantity is concerned. Mr. Forrest also includes an allowance for casualties, which runs up the estimate to about a hundred and thirty dollars; but this we do not allow, since a liberal sum is paid for insurance, which should cover casualties. No allowance is made for manure; this should be worth, at least, twenty-four dollars and ninety-two cents, which would reduce the outlay to not more than a hundred dollars.
