PUBLIC OWNERSHIP IN NEW
YORK.

An evidence of the growing popu-
larity of municipal ownership is found in
recent peculiar developments of the
mayorality campaign in New York
city.

The fusion forces, which are fighting
for mayor is the present incumbent,
George B. McClellan, came out flat
footed a short time ago in favor of
municipal ownership—made it the
principal plank in their platform. Remem-
bering Mayor Dunne's victory in
Chicago, Tammany, not daring to face
such an issue, has adopted the same
plank and during the coming contest
will shout as loudly as any in favor of
the policy which will place in the
hands of the people those utilities
which in a city are necessities of life
to the great majority.

This action will not, however, elimi-
nate the question from the campaign
as the anti-Tammany forces are ready
to pledge themselves to municipal op-
eration as well, while the present city
government holds to the policy of leasing
the municipally owned utilities to
private companies for operation. Ac-
cording to the New York Herald there
are certain valuable gas franchises
which will expire next year and con-
cerning the city's action with regard
to these will be the chief struggle. The
fusionists will demand that the city
exercise its right to condemn the
plants of these two companies and take
possession of their property and op-
erate them not only for city lighting but
for supplying gas to private consum-
ers. Such a step, if the city should
be able to supply gas for sixty or sev-
enty cents a thousand cubic feet—
which is said to be possible—would
drive the private companies, with their
monstrous load of securities, out of
the field and leave the city to light it-
self. The fusionists also demand a
radical change in the rapid transit
law, whereby the city may make sepa-
rate contracts for the construction
and operation of new subways and
may undertake their operation on its
own account if it cannot obtain satis-
factory terms from the private com-
panies. The weak is taking shape.
Tammany's change of front is in it-
self a confession that the people of
New York, the stronghold of the cor-
porations, are in favor of public own-
ership. If the voters also declare in
favor of the more radical position of
the fusionists it will be the most no-
table victory of the people's policy in
the history of America.

THE CARNIVAL.
Prospects are good for a successful
autumn carnival. Already considerable
interest is displayed and under the
energetic management of an excellent
executive committee an attractive pro-
gramme for the week is taking shape.
An effort is also being made to procure
the presence here of some of Prince
Henry's squadron which would prove
a splendid drawing card.

But something beside attractions is
needed to make the carnival a success.
That is publicity, and that costs
money. The interest of the country
people throughout the province must
be aroused and to do this properly the
country newspapers, in addition to the
city press, must not be neglected. As
soon as the programme for carnival
week is formulated a copy of it should
be placed before every resident of the
province and this cannot be done with-
out the assistance of the provincial
papers, who having no personal inter-
est in the event cannot be expected to
give their help gratuitously. Conse-
quently the committee needs some-
thing more substantial than good
wishes.

SIGNIFICANT FIGURES.
Canada's foreign trade for the finan-
cial year of 1904-05 shows a consid-
erable reduction from last year's figures,
the decrease being altogether in ex-
ports. We bought nearly eight mil-
lion dollars worth more goods abroad
than we did last year, sent eight mil-
lions more of good money out of the
country and sold these foreigners our
home products to the value of over ten
million dollars less than last year. Our
cash disbursements to foreign traders
were \$10,121,280, while our receipts from
foreign purchases of our goods were
only \$20,316,372. The country is not
getting rich very fast at that rate.

Another unpleasant feature of the
trade returns is the evidence that the
decrease is wholly in our trade within
the empire, while the chief increase
is found in our trade with the United
States. Our imports from Britain last
fiscal year were \$60,538,811, a de-
crease of \$1,422,098. Our exports to the
mother land in the same period were
\$10,936,771, a decrease of \$15,023,968.
Canada's purchases from all the Brit-
ish possessions together were \$73,622,290,
a decrease of \$13,121, whilst our exports
to the British empire totalled \$11,876,-
848, a decline of fifteen millions. In the
United States we took imports of
\$169,040,890, an increase of over nine
millions, whilst our exports to that
country were \$75,563,015, a betterment
of close on to five millions.

While the policy of the Liberal govern-
ment may not be altogether to
blame for increases or decreases in the
country's total trade it is certain that
the trend of our foreign trade is taking
is largely due to the Liberal policy and
correctly reflects the desires of the
dominant wing of the Liberal party.

just went away, he said, for a holiday
and is coming back again, but is un-
certain just when.

In the case of Clarks vs. Green yester-
day afternoon, Louis Green was ex-
amined and cross-examined, and Con-
stable Thos. X. Gibbons was examined,
and his cross-examination will be con-
tinued when the court meets at 2.30 to-
day.
