REVOLUTION IN PORTUGAL IS ONLY A MATTER OF TIME

Military Dictatorship Now Prevails and the Unrest Among the People is Steadily Increasing.

LISBON, July 27.—Everywhere the question is being asked as to when the Portuguese revolution is going to break out in full earnest. But that question can only be answered by turning to general principles. Portugal today is being governed by a Military Dictatorship led by King Carlos, and his trusted Prime Minister and friend, Senhor Franco. In the capital of Lisbon, at Coimbra, the seat of the University, at Cintra, the beauty summer resort of the wealthy, and in fact through all of the chief centres of population, a state of siege has been declared as the most effective means of enforcing the rule of the Dictatorship. On paper this looks more serious than it really is—more serious than actual practice. It means that the law which in Portugal corresponds to the Habeas Corpus Act in English speaking countries has been suspended, and that persons charged on political grounds may be dealt with by summary procedure of a military court, or shut up out of harm's way without the pretence of a trial at all. The surface indications of this state of affairs are not however very apparent even to the casual on-looker. Certainly there are more military uniforms to be seen just now in the streets of Lisbon than during ordinary times, the public buildings, the markets, the fire brigade stations are under guard, and one meets detachments of armed soldiers and saluting marching and countermarching through the streets at odd intervals throughout the entire twenty-four hours of the day. But on the other hand, business is going on as usual; the social life in all of the cities is just as gay, as free and as careless as it always has been; in the lower quarters also the people go about their usual avocations and carry their wondrously patched clothes and their extreme poverty in the manner in which they have no apprehensions that they are living over a political earthquake—just as though the word revolution had never been mentioned from one end of the land to the other.

And no matter whether the revolution it comes, proves popular or unpopular, the general impression is that it is due largely to the intrigues of active politicians; that is the trouble caused by members of the Cortes, who were suddenly relieved of their duties a short time ago by a sudden sort of "Ride Purge" the result of the movements of Senhor Franco. Then these intrigues are undoubtedly being participated in by a large number of the members of former administrations anxious to get back into public life. Of the mass of the people about 60 per cent. are officially returned as illiterate, and of course this proportion is quite outside the pale of intelligent co-operation in politics. When the majority of the population cannot read or write it can easily be

seen that the doctrine of the rule of the majority counts for little or nothing in politics. Those who possess votes exercise them in the main at the dictation of their employers or as the result of the influence of the clergy and the selling of votes in public is a thing more common in Portugal. Of the remaining 40 per cent. not more than half take any active interest in politics. It remains therefore that in Portugal politics are the portion of the wealthy, in the lower quarters and among the peasants one never hears a political discussion going on. In the wine houses the men take their vino and play cards contentedly. In the wine houses and the restaurants of the wealthy however, things are quite different. At Rodio for instance, are two fashionable cafes—Cafe Suisse and another. Here from six o'clock in the evening until six o'clock in the morning all is excitement of voice and gesture and discussions regarding political situations are constantly going on. It may be taken for granted that the well dressed habitués of the Cafe Suisse are the real fermenters of the trouble and they are divided into so many parties that the intrigues of the parties that it would be extremely difficult to gather together twenty-five of them who could agree upon any particular line of policy. Under these circumstances it is of course inevitable that the pressure must find relief somewhere. And the pressure in the main has found a vent in mobs, sacking and looting the various cafes and restaurants, the Suisse, the headquarters of the conspirators, it may seem being included in the list of restaurants which have suffered severely. Certain black hints are being thrown out as to what may take place in December next, but no justification may be found for fixing that period as the date for the settlement of all things Portuguese. Meanwhile the King, who is openly pronounced a traitor and a glutton, appears to be enjoying life and one might also say appears to be enjoying the revolution. It gives him something new to think about and detracts from the monotony of things.

GOVERNMENT MEETING.

Premier Robinson passed through the city last evening on his return from the government meeting at Fredericton. He discussed at some length the colonization branch now being organized by the government. The premier states that the branch has been formed with a view of keeping the young men of the province from emigrating to the west, and of encouraging settlers who come to the large areas of land in the northern section of the province. The colonization branch will be under the control of the department of agriculture.

A resolution was passed at the meeting ordering that flags be hoisted on the government buildings here on fine days. The resolution was passed at the suggestion of St. George's Society. An order in council was passed apportioning the usual grants to the provincial hospitals.

PORTLAND STRIKERS
OBJECT TO UNION POLICY
Carpenters Decide to Return to Work—They Ask Arbitration.

PORTLAND, Me., July 26.—A sensational move was made this evening in the local labor disturbance that has been in progress the past two weeks. Because of the refusal of union men to work with non-union men particularly on the construction of the new theatre job, the union men left two weeks ago.

At the meeting of the carpenter's union this evening fifteen members sent in a communication in which they announced their intention of returning to work on Monday, giving as their reason the belief that the action of the union was illegal, and asking that the committee on arbitration be appointed to meet with the contractor having the theatre job. The union has taken no action against the men, but say they will if they carry out their threats to return to work on an unfair job.

UNITED STATES INSISTS ON PROPER PROTECTION
ST. JOHNS, Nfld., July 26.—It was learned today that the sudden return of Sir Wm. MacGregor, governor of Newfoundland, from his outing on the west coast of the island, was due not only to the cabinet crisis precipitated by the resignation of Attorney General Morris, but also developments in the herring fishery dispute. Important dispatches have passed between the British colonial office and the governor. It is understood here that the American state department insist that American fishermen must be protected by the Newfoundland authorities while fishing for herring within treaty waters.
