PRICE OF FLOUR SOARING

The result of the corner in wheat which is at present the leading feature on the exchange, has already begun to affect the St. John flour dealers, and may soon affect the consumers.

There was a rise of 35 cents in the price of Manitoba flour yesterday in the local market and today came a rise of 25 cents on Ontario brands. Prices are quoted now as \$4.35 for Manitoba flour and \$4.15 for Ontario. It is understood that some of the smaller millers have made larger raises than this, but their action has not so far affected St. John prices. Further increases are expected, however. At present the price of flour is not on the same basis as the price of wheat, and if the corner holds out longer, and it looks as if it will, the price of flour is bound to soar.

A fair stock is held by the local jobbers, but a few days will be sufficient to make large inroads on the stock.

W. G. SCOVIL NOT QUALIFIED TO RUN

Personally Assessed on Only \$800.

No Other Incidents of Interest in the Nomination Day Proceedings at City Hall.

The fact that W. G. Scovil could not qualify for an alderman candidate was the chief sensation of the nomination proceedings today.

Mr. Scovil applied to have his name added but was met with the objection that his assessment was not high enough to allow him to qualify. An examination of the books showed that while the firm of which he is president is assessed on \$38,000, he personally, was only assessed on \$800. To settle the dispute which arose Recorder Skinner was called in and he decided against Mr. Scovil.

This with the withdrawal of C. A. Clarke and Charles H. Ramsay brings the list of possible candidates down to thirty-three.

The papers for seven of the candidates were filed yesterday and this morning another seventeen came in. The other nine are expected before four o'clock when the lists will be closed.

SEVERAL SALOON KEEPERS MAY LOSE THEIR LICENSES

Commission's Interpretation of Act May Bar Those Whose Premises Do Not Front on the Street.

Some of the saloon keepers of the city may find themselves up against a difficulty which they had not been expected when their applications for renewal of licenses are under consideration.

A meeting of the License Commission will be held in their rooms on Prince Wm. Street this afternoon and the first business taken up will be a discussion of the new licensing act. It is understood that some of the Commissioners take the view that under the meaning of the new license act, it should not be granted to premises which are so situated that a full view of the interior cannot be obtained from the street.

If this idea is carried out several bar rooms will be disqualified. Before issuing any licenses it is understood that the Commissioners will inspect the various premises and ascertain what arrangements the proprietors are going to make in order to come within the new law. If they refuse to make the necessary alterations or if their shops are so situated that they cannot do so it is likely that they will be forced to go out of business.

A NEW SECTION FORMED

On Monday evening in the town of Sussex S. B. Logan, chairman of the Grand Temple Junior committee, assisted by Sterling W. Stackhouse, G. W. U., Cyril G. Hanson, worthy archon, of Fairville Section; Kenneth Carleton, worthy usher of La Tour Section, instituted "Champlain Section No. 8" with a charter membership of thirty-one. This section bids fair to be a strong one, as the boys who compose it are intelligent, manly-looking fellows. The initiatory work was done by Sterling W. Stackhouse, G. W. U., assisted by Cyril G. Hanson.

The section elected a good staff of officers who were installed by S. B. Logan, deputy G. W. U. The section will meet every Monday evening. An effort is being made to secure a room in the old school house, which is now lying idle. The boys believe they can fix it up and make an ideal section room. The matter is now before the Sussex school board. The section has the support of the best thinking people of the town. Many of them have offered to aid the section in any way possible, because they believe it to be a place where the boys will be taught to live good, moral, temperance lives.
