I have to refer to your lotter of February Sind returning vousher No. 856 for \$88.00 in favor of H. Wyatt-Purdon.

Pemberton Reserve can be reached by Union Steamship Co. from Vancouver to Squanish and thence by Pacific Great Rastern Railway to Creekside. The service is cont-weekly and it takes from 18 to 14 hours under favorable conditions to make the trip. The distance from the Agency office to the Pemberton Receive by this route would be approximately 110 miles. The alternative route is by may of Lytton and Lillocot but it is doubtful if time could be saved by going this way.

Mr. Purden's services will not be required beyond March 30th as the work will be completed by that date.

Mr. Purdon has been deeply intersected in the promotion of agriculture in the pusherten valley, especially in the production of potatoes and turnips for select market. His activities in this respect extended to the Indians, who have been constantly encouraged by him to indrease their correspond for potato growing purposes. Mr. Purden was mainly instrumental in securing representation for the Indians on the local Pumberton Board handling the marketing of potatoes and no small amount of credit is due him for the very gratifying increase in the Indian potato production last year over that of 1938.

Then I decided to assist the Indians to clear new Reserve acroage at Pumberton, it was considered that no one in that locality was better qualified to supervise the work than Mr. Purden, especially in view of his deep interest in the walfare of the Indians and the generous assistance he had already given them in improving their crops. Mr. Purden agreed to give the necessary supervision for \$1.00 per day which he considered enough to most his out of positet expenses, and arrangements were made to exploy his accordingly.

It would appear that I should have referred the matter to the Department for authority before any definite arrangements were made with Mr. Purden and I regret that this procedure was not followed.

When the work was commenced Constable Higginbotton was not available to supervise because of illness. In any case, had constable Higginbottom been
