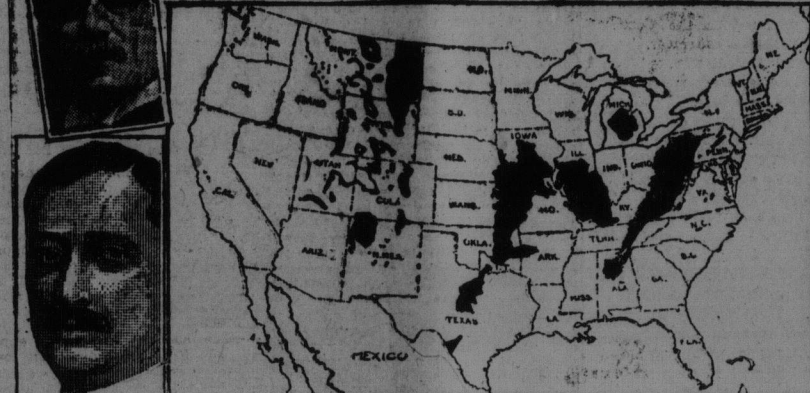

UNITED STATES MAY ALSO HAVE TO FACE COAL STRIKE

Miners in Ohio Demand Ten Per Cent. Increase and Shorter Work Day With Strike on April 1st as Alternative - Operators Declare They Cannot Meet Demands.

Cleveland, O., March 21.—Ten per cent. increase in pay with a shortening of hours equal to another ten per cent. increase was demanded by the miners today as the only basis upon which they will continue to work in the bituminous coal fields after April 1.

"Call it a strike or a suspension of the two thousand miners in bituminous fields of Western Pennsylvania, Ohio, Indiana, and Illinois, will not dig another lump after the first of the month on the present wage scale," said John P. White, president of the United Mine Workers of America. Demand was presented at another conference of 32 miners representing the union and the 32 operators in the four states directly concerned who are endeavoring to arrange a new two year wage scale to take the place of the present one, which is just expiring.

As showing the gravity of the bituminous coal situation the union delegates announced they had been authorized to treat only on the basis of their present demands, amounting to about 20 per cent. increase, and if any compromise was agreed upon, it merely could be submitted by the convention to a vote of the union, either through referendum or convention. That, President White insisted, would entail a suspension on April 1st, whether or not a strike was called.

Answering the miners' demands, the operators declared under the present earning power of the mines they could not afford to grant the increase. They insisted on a decrease of ten per cent. in the present pay. W. K. Field, of Pittsburgh; E. A. Cole, of Columbus, O.; H. P. Penna, of Terre Haute, Ind.; and H. M. Taylor, of

Chicago chairman of the operators' state organization said the railroad rates and the competition of southern coal mines operated by non-union men at lower pay, made it impossible for the operators to grant increase and mine coal at a profit.

New York, March 21.—It became known today that the Anthracite operators, who recently met here and refused the miners' demands for increased pay, have re-considered their decisions to make the answer final and will convene again in the near future to go over the situation. Whether this means that a compromise offer will be drafted could not be learned. Some independent operators have already signified their intention of granting a partial increase, however, and the assumption is that some similar action may develop from the future meetings.

ENROLL 10 HORSES AS CHICAGO VOTERS

Chicago, Ill., Mar. 21.—In wholesale accusations of fraud in registration made today it was said that in the new 18th ward the names of 18 horses in a livery stable were placed on the poll lists. There is but one voter at the stable.

Charges of attempted colonization on a large scale are made against both Democratic and Republican party workers. A big force of detectives was put to work today to check up on the registry names so that the poll lists may be in order for the primary, April 9.

Those who have looked into the situation in this ward further allege that in certain precincts close to 100 voters have been registered from houses where only 14 or 15 voters live. County Judge Owens has promised a thorough investigation.

A few odd thousand men, women, and engaged couples strolled home from the Opera House last evening with aching sides. Two and a half hours of "Dear Old Billy" was almost more than enough for the strongest constitution, and even those hardened habitués whose customary expression resembles that of a wooden nutmeg found themselves bubbling forth into long and resounding "Haw-haws."

William Hawtreay and his clever company produced one of the merriest most laugh-compelling comedies seen since the Pilgrims landed. And the rafts of the theatre, no doubt, still re-echo this morning with the hilarious outbursts that greeted the interrupted sequence of ridiculous situations.

The piece is not one of those highly complex puzzles in which some writers revel. It is the simple story of a seaside sojourner who, in search of rest and relief, after the distressing experience of a shrewish wife, finds his path beset by hopeful females, all of whom yearn for a portion of his love. The presence of the aforesaid wife, now legally separated, of a variety of attractive females and somewhat unbalanced lovers—some married, some unattached—helps in the formation of a chain of troubles for which Bill Smith becomes involved.

On the rise of the curtain the laughter begins. It is plausissimo at first, but gains in volume and intensity through each succeeding scene, ending in a double forte as the canvas drops on a row of happily united couples.

Mr. Hawtreay is the leading spirit in a group of a dozen comedies. He is the sun of hilarity around which the smaller stars revolve, the whole forming a constellation whose shafts of wit require no telescope. The show is clean, brilliant, bubbling forth really clever dialogue, and splendidly presented. It will be given again this evening and twice on Saturday, and must be seen to be appreciated.

The curtain goes up at 8:15 p. m. The management is to be commended for establishing such a rule.
