SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST LAND REGULATIONS.

Section of land, or any part thereof, of 40 acres or more, or a quarter-section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta, is available for sale by the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Applications for such land should be made to the Dominion Lands Agency (but not Sub-Agency) on certain conditions.

Duties—Six months residence on or on cultivation of the land in each of three years, a home reader may live within five miles of the land on a farm of at least 80 acres, on certain conditions, a homestead patent may be obtained as soon as homestead patent, on certain conditions.

Settler who has exhausted his good crop of land may re-empt a quarter-section acreage of his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre.

Duties—Six months residence in each of three years after re-emption, or a home reader may live within five miles of the land on a farm of at least 80 acres, on certain conditions, a homestead patent may be obtained as soon as homestead patent, on certain conditions.
