

Legislator Gets \$21,000 a Week SIX NOMINATED TO

A Pennsylvania Congressman Draws Full Two-Year Pay

Washington, Feb. 26 .- John R. Farr Republican, of Scranton, Pa., took his seat in the House today as representative of the tenth Pennsylvania district last night in voting to unseat Patrick 19% McLane, also of Scranton, who has 76% held his seat throughout the present 13% congress Mr Farr will draw \$21,000 congress. Mr. Farr will draw \$21,000 salary and incidental expenses for the six days he will serve in the House. After the House voted to remove Mc-Lane, the new member was immediately declared elected, and was sworn in just midnight. The proceedings against McLane were based on charges that he had violated the corrupt prac tices act, and also that there had been wholesale election frauds in his return

to congress.

The princely remuneration that goes with Representative Farr's six day service, approximating a rate of \$3,500 a day, results from a computation of salary and incidental allowances to cover the entire two-year period of the congress to which the House has held him to have been rightfully elected.
