### DEATH OF J. PROTHERO.

SANDWICH MAN FOUND DEAD IN A MANITOBA SHANTY.

John Putvain, Owner of the Shanty, Committed For Trial-Evidence of the Men Who Found the Body.

Winnipeg, Jan. 19.—The trial of John Putvain for the murder of J. Prothero, formerly of Sandwich, at Snake Island, Lake Winnipeg, on December 22, took place before Magistrate Scott. Mr. F. Heap defended the prisoner, and Deputy Attorney-General Patterson and J. O'Reilly prosecuted?

The first witness, H. Bostock, described going to Putvain's shanty, along with W. Darcey, to get Prothero, who was his partner, to go home with him, and, on opening the door, found both Prothero and Putvain lying on the floor, with their heads close to the door, apparently asteep. This was about 7.30 in the eventheir heads close to the door, apparently asteep. This was about 7.30 in the evening. There were no lights in Putvain's shanty, but he had a lantern with him. He soon saw something was wrong, and sent Darcey back to Raymond's house for help. Soon Raymond came, and then all three—Raymond, Bostock and Darcey—went inside. Putvain had then arisen. They began to examine Prothero for signs of life. They could find none. He had two or three slight cuts over the eye, and blood was about his face and neck. There was blood on Putvain's hands, face and shirt. The three face and neck. There was blood on Put-vain's hands, face and shirt. The three men spoke to Putvain, but he could not give any account of how it happened. Mr. S. Haymond, Magistrate, took charge of Putvain, and had him remove his

There were no signs in the shanty of There were no signs in the shanty of any row or scuffle. Five or six teams and several men had arrived that day from Selkirk to take back loads of fish. They were busy all afternoon loading their teams. Prothers was last seen alive about 5 o'clock in prisoner's shanty. Prisoner had received two bottles of whiskey that morning from Selkirk, and had been treating the boys. He never had any ill-feeling or quarrel with Prothero. When seated beside the stove that evening, Putvain said, though not spoken to ing, Putvain said, though not spoken to by any of the other three: "That was a devil of a souffle we had, but I got the best of him. It takes a good man to get ahead of me." Three or four of the teamsters heard him say this. They did not ask prisoner any questions. He com-plained of his hand being sore, and also his body. Later on Raymond and Jen-sen took the prisoner into another room and examined his body, but could not find any marks or bruises.

Evidence given by witnesses, Darcey, Raymond, Bostock, Jensen, Taylor, J. Ross and A. Ross, was very similar, Dr. Ross told of going out and holding an inquest, and of how he found the body of Prothero. The body was frozen, the face covered with blood, and small cuts over the eye. All the skin was off cuts. face covered with blood, and small cuts over the eye. All the skin was off one ear, very suggestive of teeth marks. The mouth was open, the tongue protruding. On the throat were abrasions, apparently made by finger neals. Across the bridge of the nose there was a line of marks suggestive of tee The only blood around the shanty vere a few spots on the window pane, and some on the floor beneath Prothero. The body of Prothero was brought into Selkirk. In the post-mortem they found deceased heart of the same over the eve. All the skin was off

After the evidence, the Magistrate

After the evidence, the Magistrate committed the prisoner for trial at the next Assizes.

Putvain is a very peaceable-looking man, about 45 years of age.

Prothero was a very large, able-bodied man, and, Putvain being somewhat smaller, it is a mystery how he could possibly have overpowered Prothero.

The prisoner was brought to Winnipeg by Chief Elliott.

RUSSIA'S FIRM STAND.

Will Not Give Adhesion to Sugar Convention.

St. Petersburg, Jan. 19.—Russia has replied to the British note of Novemreplied to the British note of November 30 last on the subject of the sugar convention. She reiterates the views expressed in previous votes, says she considers the British contentions to be attempts to interfere in her domestic legislation, and repudiates the idea that another State may, in its own interest, press for a change in Russian internal legislation, or in the event of Russia not agreeing to its proposals that it can penalize Russia's products without violating existing commercial treaties. The note declares that Russia can in no eventuality give her adhesion to the Brusseis agreement, and concludes:—"As Great Britain declines arbitration, and as the penalty clause cannot be applied to Russian sugar until the international commission declares the Russian system to be a bounty system, any further exchange of views before the commission settles the proposition would not be productive of results." ber 30 last on the subject of the sugar

Belleville, Jan. 19 .- A fatal accident happened on the line of the G. T. R. happened on the line of the G. T. R. near Trenton yesterday. A young woman, Miss Lillie Purdy, whose residence was in the second concession of Sidney, was driving a horse and cutter, and had to cross the railway at a place known as Gilmour's Crossing. She evidently thought she had time to cross the track in advence of an approaching express train, but must have miscalculated the distance. The horse got over, but the train struck the cutter, smashing it into fragments and instantly killing Miss Purdy, who was about 22 years of age and leaves a father and five brothers. five brothers.
