forward to family night to be held on Friday, Dec. 6, from 8 to 10.30 p.m. at



Born in England in 1882, and taking his apprenticeship there as a plasterer, he came to Canada as a young man in 1904, settling in Streetsville and worked on many homes and buildings, in this area.

In the late 30's and 40's he was caretaker at the Russell Langmaid School and was the first crossing guard at the corner of Maiden Lane and Queen st. He married Ethel Hawkins, born in Streetsville and a member of one of the early families here, who predeceased him 28 years.

Badges were presented and of the 44 girls who attended, they earned 56 badges and 20 attendance stripes.


McComb paintings on exhibit
