J. M. Hygenson les 28. January. 1845. of In January 1843 when MAnderson the Resident Superintendent of Indian Offers at Manatowavning was at Hingston he complained of the want of power to prevent individuals from the United States introducing goods into Manitoulin Island and trading mith the Indians and others resident there. They bring provisions whiskey or trinkets to sell or barter for fish on furs and of course, all duties which mould be exacted if the same articles were lunded in any other pant of the Province. No precautions however have been taken to put a stop to this traffic but as the Indian Establishment at Manitoulin Island is non under your immediate control, Thave the honor to bring the subject before you with the view that if you deem it advestable you may submit for the Governor Generals consideration whether the appaintment of a Treventive Oficer to reside at the Island might not check this traffic which besides being ellegal tends to subwent the authority afthe Superintendent of and Mepeonancies and is thus doubly prejudicial to the Indeans who are placed under their charge signed. The value of the land between the Plank Road and the Boundary line afthe Township of duseavora as appraised by Mefor Renkfulnek and Drough overages about £ 10,000; \_ in consequence of the notice issued by the Chief Supt of Indean Affairs a large portion of these lots has been taken prospession of with a view to punchase.

The land comprised between the intended Boundary line afthe Jownship of Tuscarora and Burteh's landing may be estimated at about £ 9000, many of the Settlers on these lands have purchased in good faith from the Indians and have made improvements valued by the Inspectors £ 4667. 7. 6 by for which the proprietors ought to be paid if the land is resumed for the Indians.

In reference to the black in brondage of 3600 acres which the Indians non wish to have reserved, it is to be observed that these lands have been open for sale for some time and instalments are paid on many afthe lots; the east of such a Reserve would be , take of land methout improvements & 4748.

Improvements 1587. There will be no difficulty in netaining lands in the immediate vicinity of the Church and Tarronage House if nequined as the adjoining Lato are unsald.

Sulyained is a meapitulation of the cost to the Sex Nations Indians of they retuin the lands whove mentioned. (Turnoven)
