A Wonderful Tour

PERSONALLY conducted tours are now recognised as the best opportunities for familiarizing oneself with the country traversed. The increasing popularity of the Canadian National Railways' special



trip from Winnipeg to Vancouver, run annually, is an outstanding testimonial to this fact. For the past three summers western Canadian teachers and members of other professions to the number of over 200 have taken advantage of the tour conducted by special train and steamship over the National route across the prairies, through the Rockies and the famous inside passage from Prince Rupert to Vancouver.

The 1925 Personally Conducted Tour is scheduled to leave Winnipeg on July 6 and the itinerary will be practically the same as that followed in previous years: 1,755 miles by train and 550 miles of cruising, the only change being the opportunity of going to Alaska as a side trip, either from Prince Rupert or Vancouver.

Perhaps the reason why this tour is so popular with professional and business men and women, is the rare opportunity it offers of a comparatively leisurely trip across Western Canada, with just enough time allowed to see the really interesting places. For instance: the first stop after leaving



Winnipeg is at Watrous, where the party is given an opportunity to really get ac-

quainted and at the same time visit the famous "Little Manitou Lake," one of the most wonderful mineral lakes on the continent. The three mile drive to the lake and back, with sufficient time for a dip, occupies most of the first afternoon.

A two-hour run brings the party to Saskatoon, "the Baby City of the West," where a warm welcome always awaits members of the Canadian National's Personally Conducted Tour. The evening is spent in a drive round the city.

The second day's program includes a very interesting six hours spent at Wainwright, Alberta, where is situated the largest buffalo park in existence, as well as some very promising oil wells, which are perhaps arousing more interest at the present moment, in Alberta at least, than the buffalo. However, one does not have to go to Wainwright particularly to see oil wells, but one does have to go there to see a real buffalo park. And it is well worth seeing. No more graceful sight will be en-



countered on the journey than the herd of elk that roam part of the 158 square miles of the National Park.

Four o'clock that afternoon finds the special train in Edmonton, which is not left until midnight. A drive round the city and dinner at the Macdonald hotel occupies about three hours, the balance of the evening being utilized by the party as they desire, many wishing to visit friends in different parts of the city.

And the morning of the third day brings the party to the "gem of the Rockies," Jasper National Park. The entire day will be spent at Jasper amidst snow-capped mountains, immense glaciers and canyons, beautiful lakes, waterfalls and rivers. Luncheon and dinner will be served at Jas-

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
