While this record shows a great and a fairly continuous improvement in the character of the article since the earlier inspections, it leaves much still to be desired.

I am informed by certain grinders that it is not uncommon for them to receive orders from retailers to supply an article which can be profitably sold at a certain fixed price. The filling of such an order may necessitate adjustme of the amount of worthless material (filler) corresponding to the then prevailing price of actual pepper; and ground pepper has been known to be sold at a lower price than the unground article was then commanding.

The public should understand that in purchasing an adulterated article at a lower cost than that of the genuine, they are not effecting a real economy. The added material has no spice value, and it is certain to be present in such
