BERLIN'S NEW CHURCH.

Mg. Sbarretti Attends the Dedica

Berlin, Dec. 14.-The opening and dedication of the new and magnificent St. Mary's Roman Catholic Church took place amid unusual pomp and splendor. Never in the history of Berlin has there been a church opening which attracted larger crowds and keener interest than on this occasion. The fact that his Excellency Monsignor Sharretti, the Papal delegate to Canada, attended and participated in the services, added more interest to the event. Besides this distinguished visitor, Right Rev. Thomas J. Dowling, Bishop of Hamilton; Right Rev. R. A. O'Connor, Bishop of Peterboro', and Right Rev. Bishop Mc Evay of London assisted in the impressive ceremonies. A large number of priests from the United States and various parts or Canada and former students of St. Jerome College were also in attendance. The members of the Catholic Order of Foresters, the St. Boniface Society and the Catholic Mutual Benefit Association met at their halls and at 9 o'clock marched to the church, where they formed a guard of honor from the presbytery to the church, where they formed a guard of honor from the presbytery to the church was turned in the spring of 1809, and the corner-stone was laid on Sunday, Sept. 30th, 1900. It is built of red pressed brick and its dimensions are 160 ave of a cross. The walls and ceilings are of pue white and the woodwork and light colors.
