plete, as repeated efforts have failed to secure the full particulars. It is also recognized that in spite of the wide publicity given to the preparation of this Roll, including the distribution of the Provisional Roll to all known to be concerned, there are probably some eligible for inclusion whose names have not been reported.

It is worthy of note that over 355 of those listed in this Roll are reported as having returned to the teaching profession since their discharge. In addition, a special list will be found at page 67 of 226 other returned men who have been prepared for the teaching profession by special courses arranged for them by the Department during the summer of 1919, and the winters of 1918-19, 1919-20 and 1920-21.

The information given in the Roll is arranged in the same order for all names entered. The information concerning each is written in two parts. The first part in roman type gives the name in full, the home address, the certificate held, and the professional position at the time of enlistment. The remainder in italics gives the record of military service in the following order: date of enlistment, final military rank and the last military unit, the country in which the teacher served outside of Canada, casualties and decorations, if any, with the dates and names of the engagements associated therewith, and finally the date of discharge. The following example will illustrate:—

Poyser, Beecher Doran, Iroquois; II, s. Ottawa N.S.; 1/12/15, Capt., 4th C.M.R., Fr., M.C. Passchendaele, Wounded 3/8/18, Dis. 29/3/19.

This record indicates that Beecher Doran Poyser, whose home address was Iroquois, held a Second Class certificate (II), and was a student (s) at the Ottawa Normal School (N.S.) at the time of enlistment, which was December 1st, 1915. His final military rank was that of Captain in the 4th Canadian Mounted Rifles, in which he served in France. He was awarded the Military Cross at Passchendaele, and
