

FOUR BURNED TO DEATH IN CASCAPEDIA HOME

Andrew Campbell's Father,
Wife, and Two Children
Lost Their Lives Early
Yesterday Morning—Full
Particulars Not Obtainable

CAMPBELLTON, Feb. 5.—The little village of Grand Cascapedia was the scene of a terrible tragedy early yesterday morning. Andrew Campbell, his son's wife and her two children were burned to death in a fire which destroyed their home.

The father of the children arose early and left the house about four o'clock for the purpose of getting a load of cordwood. Before leaving the house he lighted a fire in the kitchen stove with dry wood. It was not yet daylight when he left the house. He had been working for a couple of hours and was on his way home to breakfast when he noticed a heavy smoke in the direction of his home. Hurrying thither he was horrified to find the house almost buried to the ground. The fire had evidently been burning for upwards of an hour. Campbell made a hurried search for the members of his family but they were not to be found in the outbuildings. He stayed about the place, hoping against hope that they had gone to some of the neighboring farmhouses but without success. When the house had been entirely consumed, to find among the ruins the charred remains of his loved ones. From the position in which they were found it was evident that they had been suffocated while asleep.

The agonized father is at the home of a relative in Grand Cascapedia. He is in a state of collapse and it is feared that his reason will be unable to withstand the terrible blow.

Grand Cascapedia is in Bonaventure county, Que., and is situated directly across the Bay of Chaleur from this place.

FIREMEN SUFFERED FROM FROST AND FLAMES

Seven Members of New York Force
Caught in Falling Walls—One
Believed Dead

NEW YORK, Feb. 4.—Caught between collapsing floors, seven firemen were injured tonight while fighting a fire which destroyed a five-story structure at 43 North street, in the heart of the wholesale dry goods district. The monetary loss is estimated at \$300,000.

The firemen fought the flames in the bitter cold which froze the water in the stand pipes and made the pressure inadequate to confine the fire to the third floor where it started. The injured were found lying beneath the ruins in pools of fast-frozen water. The building was occupied by Baldwin and Company, Kibbo, Chaffee and Morehouse Company, the Charles C. Copeland Company, and the P. B. Smith and Company, all wholesalers. The fire spread rapidly and as employees of the building were escaping, the cable of an elevator parted and the car, filled with the frightened women and men, dropped to the basement. Fortunately no one was seriously hurt, and to their swift descent they owe their lives. Hardly had the passengers scrambled from the wreckage of the car, when, without warning, the third floor gave way and carried with it the second floor and fifteen firemen who were working within the walls. A moment later a score of firemen had rushed into the burning wreckage, recklessly determined to rescue their comrades.

Meantime the fire was burning furiously on the top floor and streams of water, thrown from adjoining buildings, half drowned the imprisoned men as well as those who chipped away valiantly wherever burning timbers held a captive. The temperature was well down towards zero and the men suffered intensely. One by one, the injured men were released, with the exception of Englebert and the car, filled with the frightened women and men, dropped to the basement. Fortunately no one was seriously hurt, and to their swift descent they owe their lives. Hardly had the passengers scrambled from the wreckage of the car, when, without warning, the third floor gave way and carried with it the second floor and fifteen firemen who were working within the walls. A moment later a score of firemen had rushed into the burning wreckage, recklessly determined to rescue their comrades.

A HALF MILLION FIRE IN BERLIN LAST NIGHT

Eight Buildings Destroyed—Help Was
Asked From Neighboring
Towns.

BERLIN, With the thermometer at 20 degrees below zero, eight buildings in the heart of the business district of this city were destroyed last night causing a loss estimated at about \$400,000. The loss is believed to be well covered by insurance.

The fire was not declared under control until it had practically burnt itself out, after burning for five hours.

The blaze started in the four-story brick Green block, the largest structure of its kind in the city. The Berlin department was utterly unable to cope with the conflagration. The one steamer was utterly useless as it broke down at the very outset and a fire engine from Portland and Lewiston, Maine, the only steamers played upon the fast increasing conflagration were two feeble auxiliaries.

Starting in the Green block on Exchange street, the flames communicated with the Berlin National Bank building next door on the corner of Exchange and Main streets, Post Office Square, and forced its way before a strong westerly gale up Main street.

In the meantime another fire started in the wooden block occupied by the J. G. Marier Shoe Company, on Main street, located in the midst of a nest of wooden structures. The fire started towards the other blaze and acting as a back fire, aided materially in putting the flames under control. Barring a shift or an increase in the wind, the fire was declared under control this morning at 1 o'clock.

Another COAST DISASTER;
UNKNOWN VESSEL SINKS

NEW YORK, Feb. 4.—News of another disaster, attributed to the recent storm off the coast, was contained in a wireless message received tonight from the tug Astro, bound from New York to Port Arthur, Texas. The tug was 21 1/2 miles N. Tuesday, in lat. 41 degrees, 7 minutes N.; long. 76 degrees, 45 minutes W.; passed a sunken vessel, either a four-masted schooner or barge. Her masts were sticking 25 feet out of the water, and she was apparently of having been quickly abandoned. Five men and spunkier tonnage still standing; mizen mast severed.
