

R. is to be allowed a postponement in the matter selecting certain lands, so as to avoid the payment of a large wild-land

ax, and, last but not least, the oil and coal lands of Southeast Kootenay that are outside the C. P. R. railway belt, are to be "reserved" for the Canadian Pacific. This political bucaneering must stop

otherwise the future of the Kootenays, already fraught with many misfortunes that are most discouraging to the stoutest, will become hopeless. And what will happen to the Kootenays is but a fair example of what will befall the entire province.

FROM RAMBLER-CARIBOO.

Development Work Under Way Steadily -Ore Shipments Restricted

Reports from the Rambler-Carib mine are to the effect that excellent progress is being made with the development work in the mine. A total 45 men are engaged at the property of whom eight are engaged in stoping ore. inches of mineral. While the ore is nar-row it carries high values, assays of \$200 to \$1000 per ton having been had.
