SENOPSIS OF CANADIAN SORTHWEST LAND REGULATIONS.

THE sole head of a family, or any mal over 13 years old, may homestead a quarter-section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency (but not Sub Agency), on certain conditions.

Sub Agency), on certain conditions.

Duties—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres, on certain conditions. A habitable house is required except where residence is performed in the vicinity.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter section alongside his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre.

Duties—Six months' residence in each of three years after earning homestead pat ent; also 50 acres extra cultivation. Preemption patent may be obtained as soon as homestead patent, on certain conditions. A settler who has exhausted his home stead right may take a purchased home stead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate 50 acres and erect a hease worth \$300.



Submarine mines are of three typ? -first, ground mines, which are us-ually of great size and laid directly on the bottom of the ocean; second anchored mines, which are attached by a cable to a weight on the bottom and are designed to float at a predetermined depth, so that they will touch and be detonated by passing ships; and third, floating mines which are dropped on the surface of the water. It is probable that the majority of the mines which have been planted during this war are of the second or anchored type, arranged to be dis-charged automatically when they are struck by a passing vessel.
