FIVE GERMAN MINISTERS OF STATE RESIGN PORTFOLIOS

Von Kuehlmann, Former Ambassador to Constantinople, Becomes the New Foreign Secretary; Liberal Press Dissatisfied by Changes

Berlin, Aug. 7.—Official announcement was made yesterday that five Ministers of State, including Foreign Secretary Zimmermann and five Secretaries of State, including Finance Minister Lenz and Interior Minister von Loebell, had resigned their portfolios.

Dr. Richard von Kuehlmann, the German Ambassador to Turkey, has been appointed Secretary for Foreign Affairs, in succession to Dr. Zimmermann.

The Ministers and Secretaries of State who resigned were:—

- Minister of Justice—Dr. Beseler, appointed November, 1905.
- Minister of Ecclesiastical Affairs and Instruction—Dr. von Trott zu Solz, appointed July, 1909.
- Minister of Agriculture, Domains and Forests—Dr. von Schorlemer, appointed in 1910.
- Minister of Finance—Dr. Lenz, appointed August, 1911.
- Minister for Interior—Herr von Loebell, appointed May, 1914.

Secretaries of State

- Imperial Postoffice—Herr Kraetke
- Imperial Secretary of Justice—Dr. Lisso.
- Secretary for Foreign Affairs—Dr. Alfred Zimmermann, appointed November, 1916.
- President of the Food Regulation Board—Adolph von Batoeki.
- Dr. Richter, Herr Secretary of the Imperial Home Office, also resigned his post.

Dr. Karl Helfferich will continue to be the representative of the Imperial Chancellor and a member of the Ministry of State and Temporary Minister of the Interior.

Split up Economics Ministry

The Landrat von Graevitz was appointed to succeed Arnold Wunnschaffle as Chief of the Imperial Chancery.

The Ministry of Economics will ultimately be separated from the Ministry of the Interior, and Herr Waldtraf, Mayor of Cologne, will be appointed Minister of the Interior, the newspaper, a disciple of the policy of doing everything possible to avoid the further alienation of Great Britain, believing that after the war friendship between Great Britain and Germany is necessary to the latter.

Dr. von Kuehlmann, The Neues Courant adds, is an anti-annexationist, and the newspaper expresses the opinion that in the Foreign Secretaryship he would do his utmost to bring about an understanding with England at the earliest possible time.

Great Air Raids Made by Italians
Giant Plane Used in Course of Attacks Upon Pola

(By PERCIVAL GIBBON.)

Italian Headquarters, Aug. 7.—The Italians are launching against the Austrian naval port of Pola vast and startling flights of giant Caproni airplanes, each with a crew of four or five men, and it is to place upon the enterprise the final cachet of Italian perfection, with each raid there travels in the leading machine the single man whose words and gestures are followed breathlessly throughout the country, Gabriele d'Annunzio, the acclaimed poet of Italians. The Austrians, too, have been raiding lately, sprinkling bombs on many inland villages far from military objectives. The Italian raids upon Pola during the nights of August 2 and 3 were not merely reprisals for many useless murders, but an assault upon the nest of submarines, airships, airplanes and war vessels with which Austria seals the entry to the Gulf of Trieste. The results, which are yet to be confirmed and tabulated, are surely great. I have heard the statement of an aviator who took part that Pola as a naval base is already extensively damaged.

Thirty-six Machines in First Raid.

The first raid was carried out by thirty-six machines, including fast nighting machines, which escorted the great Caproni bomb droppers. Six and a half tons of bombs were dropped in all, and there would have been more but that the third wave of attackers failed to find purely military targets. The following night they again returned to the attack. This time a light fog favored the aviators, and eight tons of explosives were deposited where they were likely to do the most damage. The results were well observed, and are described as entirely satisfactory. I must await the precise details, but I hear on all hands that these will be startling.
