



DIAMOND JUBILEE OF ST. BASIL'S CHURCH

A Brief Resume of Seventy-Five Years of Catholicity in the City—Progress Has Been Steady and Achievements Many

Red letter days for St. Basil's church and parishioners will be Wednesday and Thursday of next week, when the diamond jubilee of the parish and the fiftieth birthday of the present church will be jointly celebrated, with both religious and social recognition of the event.

Seventy-five years ago, in 1842, Father Miller, the Rev. Michael Robert Mills, to Brantford, to found the parish which so thrived as St. Basil's, that twenty-five years later saw the abandonment of the Crown street church for a newly erected building facing Palace street, the edifice which has developed into the present church. And in the fifty years following, St. Basil's has thrived more heartily than ever, and though her sons have scattered, it is hoped that many will retrace their way to Brantford for the jubilee next week.

As a prelude to the jubilee of the church, is the tridium or three days' mission conducted this week by the Rev. T. J. McFahon, S.J., late of Loyola college, Montreal. The social celebration will commence on Monday night, when in the clubrooms on

church substantially what it is today.

Later Pastors
In 1882, Father Bardou's pastorate came to an end, he being succeeded by the Rev. Peter Lennon, and there are few Brantfordites of to-day who do not cherish fond memories of that universally respected and beloved priest, who for a period of twenty-eight years guided the church to prosperity and success. Ill-health necessitating his resignation, he bade reluctant farewell to the vineyard where he had labored so long and faithfully, and in 1911 the present pastor, Very Rev. Dean R. E. Brady, formerly of St. Lawrence's church, assumed charge of the parish. Under his administration, three of the city's finest buildings were erected, in St. Basil's deanery, on the corner of Pearl and Palace Sts., St. Basil's school and St. Joseph's convent, adjoining on Pearl St. To his energies are due two countless improvements which have been introduced into the church. His assistants are Rev. Father L. Drogorski and Rev. Father A. Catania.

The Church To-day
St. Basil's church to-day, built of white brick with stone trimming and roofed with slate, is a model of the purest Gothic architecture. The church boasts one of the finest organs in Canada, the gift of Mrs. E. P. McDermott, its value being estimated at \$10,000. Affiliated with the church are such societies as the League of the Sacred Heart, the Altar Society, the Ladies' Aid, and the Society of the Blessed Virgin, and of each of these much might be said. In addition is the ladies' club, an organization for social and church work, under whose auspices the bazaar is conducted each week. Catholic fraternal societies represented in the city include the Knights of Columbus, C. M. B. A., and the Catholic Order of Foresters.

Separate Schools
The Separate schools of the city, St. Basil's and St. Mary's, accommodate well over five hundred pupils of Catholic families, this number excluding those who have graduated from the Collegiate Institute. Of recent years, new schools have been erected in both parishes, yet both are overcrowded to-day, and the problem of separate school accommodations is even more troublesome than that in the public schools, because of the large number of children of foreign birth, almost all of whom are educated in the separate schools, while their parents find employment in concerns which contribute taxes to the public schools only. The present teaching staff of the two schools comprises eight sisters of St. Joseph, six at St. Basil's and two at St. Mary's, and one lay teacher at each school. Under able tuition, an exceptionally high record has always been set in matters educational by the separate schools of the city, and from them have gone forth many who have made their mark in the world.

VERY REV. DEAN BRADY
Ever zealous and efficient, the present pastor of St. Basil's church enforces the respect and esteem of his congregation and citizens generally. Crown street the ladies of the church will open a bazaar to continue the entire week, with the purpose of bringing together old and new parishioners, as well as the sale of various articles to raise funds for the decoration and beautification of the church.

The religious celebration proper will take place on Wednesday, when His Lordship, Bishop Dowling, of Hamilton, will sing the Pontifical High Mass at half past ten in the morning. Benediction of the Blessed Sacrament will be held in the evening, while the school children will confer in the club rooms. On Thursday, a solemn requiem Mass will be sung, for the memory of deceased parishioners. A similar program will be observed during the two days at St. Mary's church.

Founding of the Church
For a longer period of time than the memory of most can span, St. Basil's church has been the pillar of Catholicity in Brantford, and from the earliest years of its existence its name and its congregation have been linked alike with the best interests of the city, which fosters them. A brief history of the growth of the church at such a time as the present must thus be of interest to all.

Prior to the year 1842, the church of Brantford was minus a Catholic church, and many a weary mile did the faithful settlers of that religion judge every Sunday, to hear Mass at Dundas. The need of a nearer place of worship becoming urgent, property on Crown street was acquired for the purpose, and the first Catholic church, a white frame building, erected there. In 1842 the church was formally opened, and Father Mills of Dundas assumed charge of the newly created parish.

Early Pastors
His stay was but a brief one, however, and for the first eleven years of the church's existence no pastors came and went. Rev. Stephen Ferguson, Rev. James Quinlan, Rev. John O'Brien, Rev. P. O'Dwyer and Rev. J. J. McFahon, S.J., were the Father Mills in the parish, all remaining for but a brief incumbency. In 1853 came the Rev. J. Ryan, who remained pastor of the church for a period of six years, giving place in 1859 to the Rev. A. Caravan. During these years the congregation had increased rapidly in numbers, until the original church was no longer of sufficient size to accommodate the parishioners, and the erection of a new church was undertaken, on the site of the present church. In 1869 the cornerstone was laid, and in the following year the building was completed. Seven years later, Rev. Father Reddon having succeeded Father Caravan, the church was again enlarged by almost twice its original size, and interior improvements carried out which make the

WRECK OF AN ADRIAN HONOR

WEST LIND ISLANDS
The sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, who was at the commencement of the war, and has since continued to be a British subject, may homestead a quarter-section of available Dominion Land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applications must be made in person at Dominion Lands Office or sub-agency for District. Entry by proxy may be made on certain conditions. Entries—Six months residence plus cultivation of land in each of three years.

In certain districts a homesteader may secure an adjoining quarter-section as pre-emption. Price \$500 per acre. Pre-emption patent as soon as homestead patent on certain conditions. A settler after obtaining homestead patent may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$500 per acre. Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate 50 acres and erect a house worth \$5000.

Holders of entries may count time of employment as farm laborers in Canada during 1917, as residence duties under certain conditions. When Dominion Lands are advertised or posted for entry, returned soldiers who have served overseas and have been honorably discharged, receive one day priority in applying for entry at local Agents' Office (but not Sub-Agents). Exchange papers must be presented to Agent.
