THE DIFFERENCE IN ROAD EXPENDITURE

The Ottawa government has again brought before the House the road bill which the Liberal Senators defeated last year. It is stated that the same Senate will defeat the bill again this year merely for party advantage and with no consideration for the desire of the people to have better roads.

The Murray Government has caught the idea that the road bill of the Ottawa Government is immensely popular with the people and so they have introduced a bill to borrow money to spend about \$10,000 on the highways in each county but they are unable to give any information as to how this money is to be spent.

The money proposed to be spent by the Borden Government on roads will be taken out of current revenue for that purpose and the liberals oppose it. The money the Murray government proposes to use is to be raised by further pledging the credit of the province and increasing our already large mortgage. This the liberals heartily endorse.

Can anyone inform us why sensible men will support politicians who resort to such means for what they consider political advantage?
