

DOUKHOBORS AGAIN ON PILGRIMAGE Out Towards Winnipeg Looking for Warmer Climes and Better Times--Perhaps Sunny Alberta

Maklnak, Man., July 17.—Clothed in scanty straw hats and blue nightdresses, thirty simple minded and deluded Doukhobors passed here this afternoon on their long pilgrimage to Winnipeg and the warm country where they expect to find a modern Utopia in which the sun always shines and one does not have to eat meat or butter, but can live to a ripe old age on black bread and raw onions.

All the pilgrims were weary and footsore and many limped painfully, with maimed and bruised feet, but pressed onward with an unshakable and unshakable belief that they will soon reach a haven of rest. Old men, aged women and wee children tramped side by side, but every face, young and old, showed an ineffable sweetness and patience tinged with joy, betokening their calm assurance that they were only following the command of the prophet.

Where are you going? they were asked. "To a warmer country," answered one of the women that spoke English slightly. "What do you want?" "A warm country where no one must work, where one does not eat meat, nor milk, nor butter, where one can live on fruit and it is sunshine all the time.

Then the whole band lifted up their hands to heaven and in their eyes shone an angelic light as they broke into a hymn of praise. Louder and louder grew the volume of sound, the singers raising their arms with their voices, waxing more and more enthusiastic.

They quickened their step and marched forward to their own music. They sang, of course, in their native Russian tongue, but it was not unpleasant to the ear. On the contrary it was quite pleasant as their voices rose and fell in a distinct harmony.

Long Weary Trip The party of Doukhobors left Swan River on Monday, July 8, about 30 strong. On Tuesday they arrived at Minnitsou, on Thursday at Cowan and on Sunday last at Ethelbert. They came into Dauphin on Monday night, and spent the night in Bordin's stables, singing and chanting and straggling through the streets looking for food. All meat and butter offered was refused, only onions and bread did they accept. Tuesday morning they left Dauphin and started for Ochre River, where they arrived in the late evening, having travelled seven miles that day. They pitched there all night, but were not allowed to get much rest as they were continually bothered by people in the community whose curiosity had not been satisfied.

They struck off again along the Canadian Northern tracks for Winnipeg at which place they intend to rest before proceeding to their promised land.

In ten days they have travelled about 150 miles, nearly half the entire distance, so at their present rate of travelling the band will arrive in Winnipeg about a week from Sunday. They have apparently no method in their madness, if mad they may be called. If they are not entirely sane their monomania is at all events harmless. They profess to be all equal and when questioned that they have no leader.

Looking for Jesus "We are all brothers, all the same, one with another. We are following our Lord Jesus' example. He walked and we must walk too."

The party now on the road is composed of fifteen women, eleven men and four boys. One aged man, one woman who recently gave birth to a child and four little children have preceded the party a few miles by train. These with a few others were so tired and worn out that they dropped exhausted on the road last week.

The Doukhobors had \$8 amongst them and with this money they bought the weaker ones tickets as far as the money would carry them. Strawberries are just getting ripe along the railroad and on these many of the women and children try to sustain life supplementing the fruit with a little bread.

Will They Move? Winnipeg, July 18.—Will the Doukhobors of Saskatchewan remove to Alberta and enter upon the work of the production of beet sugar in which the Mormons are largely engaged was the question raised by the arrival in the city of a committee of that community headed by Peter Veregin.

The travellers were accompanied by C. W. Speers, colonization agent of the Dominion government, and they had just completed a trip through a portion of southern Alberta, where they inspected lands especially in the vicinity of Lethbridge and Raymond. In the west they also made most careful inquiry into the various processes connected with the extraction of sugar from the Sugar beet and were through the plants which have been established there by the Mormon settlers. Mr. Veregin could not be seen, but information in reference to the trip was obtained from Mr. Speers.

Pleased with Beet Sugar. "While in the west the committee made careful inquiry regarding the climate of Southern Alberta," said Mr. Speers, "and also with reference to the possible range of production in the districts which can be irrigated. They were especially interested in the consideration of the culture of fruit and, owing to the fact that the Russian people are very familiar with all the processes connected with the extraction of sugar from the sugar beet, they were desirous of learning all that was possible with reference to this industry. The committee are very well pleased with the districts and are confident that by the use of proper methods, the industry of their people would soon produce excellent results there.

The members of the society are manifesting no rebellious spirit at the action of the government in this regard. They are peaceable and will continue to prosper. It is their intention to improve their holdings in every possible way and raise their lands to the highest state of cultivation. They will continue to assist in the work of railway construction, and being frugal and exceedingly industrious, there is no danger of their ever being in want.

Government and C.N.R. to Blame for No Excursion to Indian Head—Strong Resolution. Prince Albert, July 19.—Prince Albert Agricultural Society here passed a strong resolution condemning the Saskatchewan government and the C.N.R. in not running an excursion from this point to the experimental farm at Indian Head; all points south of Saskatoon and along the main line of the C.P.R. were able to go to the experimental farm at Indian Head at excursion rates, but the farmers of the north were excluded.

Some two hundred farmers and their families were looking forward to the excursion. Last year more people went from Prince Albert than from any other point north of Regina. The feeling here is that the provincial government is to blame. Copies of the resolution were forwarded to the government at Regina and the head officials of the C.N.R.

SAD TRAGEDY. Indian Head, July 19.—A tragedy occurred last night at Seibel's place some 22 miles south of here, when Paul Seibel, a young man 22 years of age, took his own life by drinking gopher poison. Seibel, who was farming on the plains, was apparently taking an afternoon nap while his wife was working in the garden. She went into the house and went upstairs, where he was supposed to be sleeping, and found him suffering intensely. "Oh God, get me some milk!" he cried. She ran excitedly to get the milk, and returned in time to see him fall dead from the effects of a bottle of hopper poison he had taken. Word was brought into the police here at midnight. Sergeant Dubay and Corporal Hunt went out this morning. After making an inquiry into the details the coroner decided that an inquest was unnecessary. The deceased young man was a son of Alex. Seibel, of the Seibel Plains, and had only been married about three months. He had been worried for some time over financial embarrassments.

MODEL FARM FOR NORTH. Prince Albert Likely to Get the Plum from Ottawa. Prince Albert, July 19.—Messrs. Angus McKay, of Indian Head, and Mr. Saunders, of the department of agriculture, Ottawa, were in the city Saturday seeking a site for an experimental farm which the Dominion government propose to establish in the northern part of the province. In company with S. J. Donaldson, M.P., Senator T. O. Davis and Mayor Cook, the two representatives of the government were driven around the city and adjoining country. The Miller farm on the left in the east end of the city met with the approval of the whole party and it was thoroughly gone over. The location is a particularly good one, as the soil is all that could be desired and the site is a commanding one, whence the buildings and the farm generally may be seen to advantage.

So far no experimental farm has been established in the northern part of the west, where conditions are entirely different to what they are on the prairie. In the north mixed farming is carried on and the people generally are entitled to an experimental farm. Both Mr. McKay and Mr. Saunders were very much taken with the natural beauties of Prince Albert. The prettiest city in the west makes an impression on all who visit here.
