COUNTY NEWS.

FIFTY PARAGRAPHS POINT, EDLY PUT.

Crabs Called for the Curious—Parley Personal Paragraph—Takes and Jingles—The Week's Warnings Wittingly Worded.

Brockville Cheese Board

Special to Reporter—**ASHWOOD HALL, July 23, 1891.**

There was the usual large attendance of gentlemen interested in this important industry. There was, however, another element in the rank and file. All parties were in a hurry to get through with sales of cheese in order to take in as much as possible of the much talked of demonstration. There were about seven thousand boxes of cheese registered, nearly equally divided between colored and white. Much to the surprise of many in the trade, colored goods made another strong lead in price, which brought a smile to many gentlemen having them in stock.

As the goods were sold in a hurry, the market was somewhat irregular. Colored cheese sold at 44 shillings, which gave the white cheese a 9c point, which was the highest made. 85c was ruling price on this class of goods. White cheese made 85c, as the high point, 89c for lowest, 87 1/2c ruling. Up to the first appearance of a movement upon the part of buyers, president Singleton announced an adjournment for one week.

On examination it was found that the goods had been checked on the bulletin board and sold in forty minutes, representing a business of say one thousand dollars a minute, a fact which perhaps never before occurred in the history of the board. Newly arrived person admitted that ex-president Murphy made a dandy auctioneer. For corresponding date of last year 6,882 boxes were sold. Ruling price 81c, which was also the high price made. Liverpool cable was 41 shillings.

July goods are giving better satisfaction among buyers than our June cheese.

Sabbath Observance.

A bill entitled "An Act to Secure the Better Observance of the Lord's Day" has been agreed upon by the special committee of the House of Commons to whom it was referred some time ago for consideration and report. The Com. has made extensive amendments to the original bill as submitted to it, chiefly by striking out clauses considered too stringent in their provisions and not practicable in their application to some of the provinces of Canada, with many of whose established customs it would interfere. The amended bill reported from committee appears to be a compromise between the original bill and the amendments, and is as follows: The printing, publication and sale of any newspaper, provided, however, that necessary office work may be performed after 9 o'clock in the evening of the Lord's Day, for the purpose of facilitating the publication of the morning issue of any daily paper, the opening of any of the canals in Canada to traffic or business from 6 a. m. to 10 p. m. on Sunday. This provision may be suspended in any year by an order-in-council after the 15th of October. No railway train is to be loaded at any station, or empty cars moved from one station to another, nor any freight train permitted to be hauled on Sunday, except such as are made up of live stock or perishable freight, and where the dispatching of trains is deemed necessary; and where the necessary connections, shall be permitted on any trunk line in Canada, but merely local passenger trains are prohibited. A sub-section of this provides that at such time as the laws of the United States shall make corresponding provisions, no through freight in transit from one point on the said frontier, shall be allowed to pass over Canadian roads on the Lord's Day, except live stock and perishable goods.

A few days ago James Dunlop, of Ottawa, missed the sum of \$150 and it occurred to him that the amount had been stolen. Certain parties were accused of having taken the money which was of course denied. However, shortly afterwards one of the accused stated that he had a curious dream in which he saw the thief dig a hole in the ground and deposit the money therein. On the following morning he was unable to find the money and therefore proceeded to the spot dreamed of, and on turning up the turf the bills were discovered and promptly returned to the owner.

The laws of Ontario provide that a person taking up any stray stock shall give notice of such taking up by publishing a notice three times in a weekly newspaper, if one is published within the section where the stray was taken up; and if the property is not called for within three weeks after the first issue of the notice, the finder shall go before a justice of the peace and take oath to the finding and advertising. If the property is not claimed within one year and should not exceed fifty dollars in value, it then belongs to the party taking the same up; if over fifty dollars, it shall be advertised by the justice and sold, and the excess of all expenses shall be paid over to the county treasurer. Any person taking up an stray, and neglecting to cause the same to be advertised and appraised, shall be liable to a fine of \$20. The stray law applies also to any other personal property which may be found in a like manner.

Lift Your Hat.
