De. Henry De Groot, well known all over the California coast as a mining expert, who was 73 years old and very feeble, was killed by a train at Alameda, Cal.

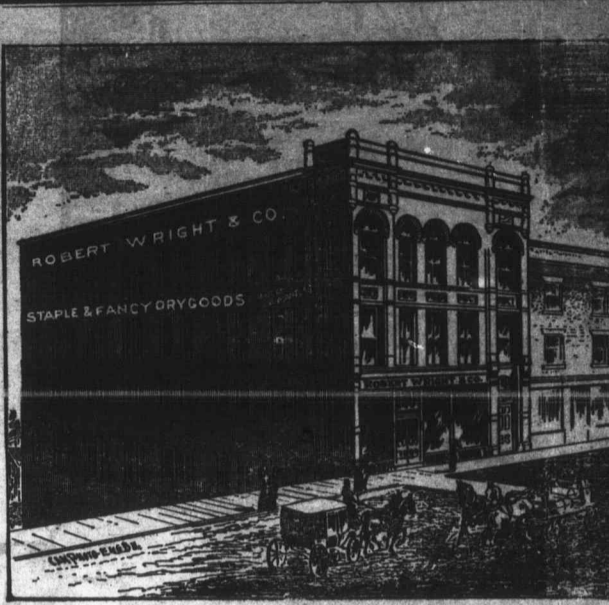
