DR. BRYCE URGES NECESSITY FOR NEW LEGISLATION.

Many Local Health Authorities Neglect Their Duty in This and in the Matter of Preventing Filth-Health Board Meets.

Toronto, Nov. 27.-The failure the vaccination law passed upon the Provincial Board of Health yesterday by the Secretary, Dr. P. H. Bryce, in his quarterly report. The provision for the appointment of public vaccinators by municipalities or local boards of health was in a great majority of instances wholly neglected. The result was that there was growing up a population largely unvaccinated, which condition would be very serious should smallpox break out in the cities, towns and villages, where 45 per cent. of the population of Ontario resided. Such a condition had existed in American cities, when, in 1901, 500.000 people were compulsorily vaccinated in Boston, and neary 1,000,000 in Philadelphia. Dr. Bryce ggested new and simpler legislation, which would provide for a specially ap-pointed public vaccinator; for instance, the Medical Health Officer, to whom the clerk would send a list monthly of the births of all children registered, and the officer would then visit them at their homes and offer free vaccination. The cost to an ordinary township of 3,000 people would not exceed \$100 a year. Where free vaccination was refused, the provision would be made that the child ould not be admitted to public or private schools without producing a certificate of vaccination. The bill would probably, include the present provisions covering the circumstances of an out-

break of smallpox. In the other portion of his report, Dr. Bryce made some stringent criticisms of the neglect of many local health boards and a large portion of the public with regard to the dangers of filth. The situation called for some radical action. Reports of rather extensive outbreaks of enteric at Burk's Falls and Sault Ste. Marie, due to bad sanitation, were also submitted by Dr. Bryce. Smallpox had not been prevalent, but its existence in the neighboring States threatened another epidemic this winter, and there were now 50 cases in the Province. The

report was adopted.

The report of the Committee on Epidemics, submitted by Dr. J. J. Cassidy, cil in being the first in Ontario to pass by-law requiring all practising phy sicians to notify the Medical Health Of ficer of the existence of all cases of pulmonary consumption which they are attending. This step had been urged by the committee in June, 1900

GRAIN TRADE SATISFIED.

The Number of Grades For Export Grain is Increased.

Toronto, Nov. 27 .- An arrangement satisfactory to the grain has been made with the Trunk Line Association in respect to he number of grades that will be alowed on grain exported via New York. The Trunk Line Association had proposed at first to allow only 15 grades, nine to Ontario and Quebec, and six to Manitoba. As the result of the agitation here, however, the association has agreed to allow twelve bins for Ontario and Quebec, three more than first intended. Manitoba is still to have six, which will be two less than last year. The extra three bins in Ontario will be used for No. 3 white wheat, rejected wheat, and No. 1 white oats.
