SOUTH DAKOTA'S WIND CAVE. It Is So Extensive That Some People

Say the State Is Hellow.

The good people of South Dakota regard Wind cave as the tenth wonder of the world. From surface indications it would seem that a large part of the state is hollow, and the extent of Wind cave is unknown. It was discovered in 1877 by a notorious chara-ter known as 7, ame Johnny," who distinguished himself on several occasions by holding up the Deadwood stage and ambushing caras as of unwary travelers. His lack of prudence in one of these adventures re-Say the State Is Hollow. grans of unwary travelers. His lack of prudence in one of these adventures resulted in a "necktie party" which ended Johnny's career, so that he was not able to profit by his discovery. J. B. McDoñald rediscovered the phenomenon in 1884 by finding a large gap in the plain through which the wind was pouring out with great force, like the draft of a chimney. There are similar vent holes a chimney. There are similar vent holes at frequent intervals over the prairie, and the people of this neighborhood claim that several have been opened within the

last few years.

The cave is divided into chambers. It is asserted that more than 3,000 different rooms have already been discovered varying in size from 12 feet in diameter to over three acres, and this is believed to be only a small portion of the cavern. The cave ceiling is not so high that of Mammoth cave, and the geologic formations are not as wonderful as those of Luray, but it has many attractions, and one in particular—the dryness of the at-mosphere—which is said to afford instant and complete relief to asthmatic people.

The temperature of the cave is about 45 degrees the year round, being unaffected by the variations of the thermometer outside, but the variations of the barometer are sharply perceptible. When the mercury rises on the outside, a current of air flows into the cave and follows a certain direction. When the glass falls, this current changes and the air flows in another direction. This phenomenon has not been studied by competent meteorologists, but is so apparent that it attracted the attention of the early explorers of the can-

The effect of the air on the cave upon asthmatic people is equally peculiar. A sufferer from that disease finds imme diate relief upon entering the cave, and there will be no return of the trouble for several days after. This has suggested the possibility of a permanent cure for such as can have the privilege of visiting the cave frequently .-

His Majesty wore the uniform of an admiral of the fleet. He was accompanied only by Sir Francis Laking, Captain Ponsonby and Captain Welch, formerly commander of the toyal yacht. Though the drive from Marlhorough House to the station was made without an exort, the route was made without an escort, the route was lined with people, who cheered vocifenously. For the first time since the accession of the King, His Majesty seemed himself again, bowing and smiling on every side. Many of the septators exclaimed, "The same old Prince!" as His Majesty's armayers. Prince!" as His Majesty's appearance once more appealed to the crowd as the jowal prince of former years. The royal yacht was escorted by the cruis-ers Australia and Severn. No guard of honor was mounted, nor were any
