FRANCE IS NOW QUIET

No Further Disturbance—Troops Have Returned to Barracks.

Leader of Rioters Appears Before President—Forces of Troops in the Streets—Insurgents Demand Release of Those Already Taken—Mutinous Troops Return to Barracks—Prefect Beaten.

Paris, June 24.—The most interesting event yesterday in the wine growers' revolt was the visit of Marcelin Albert, the leader of the disturbing element in the south of France, to Premier Clemenceau.

Yesterday morning the man for whom the police and troops have been vainly scouring the country for a fortnight, appeared suddenly at the Ministry of the Interior. He wore the simple garb of a southern peasant.

The cotton shirt, the silk handkerchief around his neck and the carpet bag in his hand aroused the suspicion of the corps of detectives now constantly guarding the Premier. But when he had established his identity, Albert was admitted to the presence of Clemenceau, with whom he had a fifteen minutes' talk.

A semi-official account of the interview says that the Premier used extremely strong language, virtually blaming his visitor for all that has happened in the south, the refusal to pay taxes, the strike, the resignation of the officials of municipalities and the bloodshed that has occurred—everything in fact.

A profound sense of relief now pervades the French capital at the check to the outbreak in the south, which is described by ex-Premier Ribot as the worst internal crisis in France in the past 37 years.

The Government now apparently is satisfied that it has the situation well in hand. Overwhelming forces of troops garrison the whole area to prevent a recurrence of the armed revolt against the central power. Such a mobilization of military forces has not previously been witnessed in the life of the third republic.

Despatches report that a general surface calm prevails, although there are one or two storm centres in isolated districts.

Senators and deputies representing the south called at the Elysee Palace Saturday night and asked President Fallieres to intervene personally to secure the release of the members of the Argelliers committee, under arrest as the surest means of ensuring pacification. The President regretted that his office did not permit him to comply with the request.

No further disturbances of importance were reported yesterday, the mutinous troops returning to their barracks at Agde, and the roll call showed only one man missing.

Later details of the capture of Sub-Prefect Leullier show that soldiers who tried to protect him were forced to retreat before the fury of the mob. Leullier's clothes were literally torn from him and he was badly beaten.

Disturbances Over. The fear that yesterday, being Sunday, would witness a renewal of the rioting in the affected districts, fortunately was not realized, although the prefecture at Niemes was stoned.

There is a heavy concentration of troops at Narbonne, Montpellier and other centres of disturbance.

Gen. Caillie, who is in command at Narbonne, thinks the chief danger now is from professional agitators and anarchists. He has information that a large number of anarchists have crossed the frontier from Spain, but declares he now has a sufficient force to patrol every foot of railroad in his territory.

The peasants view every stranger with suspicion. Two newspaper correspondents narrowly escaped lynching in the mistaken belief that they were spies.

Several deputies from the south, who hurried home on Friday to aid in calming their constituents, received such a hostile reception that they were forced to return to Paris.

M. Albert left for the south at nine o'clock.

Just before he left, it was officially stated that he had promised M. Clemenceau to do his utmost to induce his countrymen to return to work and to cease their disturbances.

Cheered the News. Narbonne, France, June 24.—The funeral of the sixth victim of the rioting on Thursday last was held yesterday. There was no disorder.

Despatches describing Marcelin Albert's interview with Premier Clemenceau, were read to crowds throughout the south and were received with thunderous cheers. The affair appears to have made a most marked impression.

Fresh troops continue to arrive and are being distributed over the country. It is estimated that there are more than 70,000 in the three departments.

Mice In Printer's Office. The compositors of an office in Glasgow a number of years ago had often their pockets invaded by mice, which infested the place, this being revealed on taking out their paper-enveloped bread, and discovering it artistically holed and notched.

Rats also periodically appeared when mice would become less visible, but whether or not from fear of suffering extermination by the larger invaders cannot be said. One comp., on his morning's arrival, when lifting his apron experienced an unusual weight and discovered within the folds of the apron a nest of mice, their size indicating extremely recent birth. A dead mouse was found a few yards off.

The suggestion gained credence that this was the mother mouse, and that, for safety of its progeny from the rat, she had secreted them in the apron, having to clamber some 10 or 12 inches to do so—and had only temporarily left them when she met her fate.

SCANDAL IN ROYAL NAVY.

Petty Officers Graft From Contractors In Construction Works.

London, June 24.—"Grave irregularities" in the term the parliamentary committee of public accounts gives to certain conditions in the navy, on which it issued a report on Saturday.

The committee found that a widespread custom was the acceptance of commissions from contractors by petty officers, but the report adds that severe disciplinary measures have been adopted to suppress the custom.

The committee objects strongly to the action of the admiralty in contracting for the construction of the armored cruisers Invincible, Inflexible and Indomitable, without competition, although the admiralty officials explained that they wished to keep the plans secret.

The committee finds that the builders of the battleship King Edward VII. secretly patched up a defective cast rudder, which the government was obliged to replace. The builders gathered together a few of their employees on a certain Sunday and by electric welding concealed a huge fault in the rudder.

The report of the committee says: "We hope it will not again be our duty to investigate a case where a British firm, for commercial advantage, will callously hazard the lives of hundreds of their fellow-countrymen."
