Mr. G. H. Vroom, Apple Inspector, for this province, has given for publication the following complete statement of the shipment of apples from the past season. The total quantity was 331,000 barrels. Of these 423,556 were sent to London, 67,100 to Liverpool, 26,239 to Glasgow and 14,853 to Hull, the latter being shipped from Annapolis. These with 255 barrels sent by way of Montreal, make up the total given above. About 50,000 barrels were sold in Newfoundland, New Brunswick, Prince Edward Island, Cape Breton and Eastern Nova Scotia.
