

## AT THE U. N. B. ACADEMICAL YEAR

Matriculation Examination This Morning—A Bright Outlook for University for the Coming Year.

The academical year of 1906-07 began at the University of New Brunswick this morning, with the holding of junior and senior matriculation and county scholarship examinations, which were conducted by the respective professors in the college library. The schedule of examinations is as follows:

Thursday: Mathematics, 9:12; Latin, 2:4.  
Friday: English, 9:12; History and Geography, 2:4.  
Saturday: Greek and French, 9:11; Chemistry, 11:12:30; Natural History, 2:4.

There were about fifteen candidates of both sexes trying the examinations this morning. Lectures will be resumed on Monday, October 1st, under the most promising conditions. From all indications the freshman class will be fully as large as that of previous years, with the prospect of a more even balance being maintained between the arts and engineering departments. Of late years the engineers have been in the majority at the U. N. B., but the young men of New Brunswick seem to be now waking up to the fact that they have as good an art course as can be obtained anywhere in Canada, at their very doors.

The staff has undergone many changes since the last few years, and there are two new professors again this year. The absence of Dr. Harrison from the College halls will be most keenly felt. All the professors are in the city except Prof. George, who is at present at the White Mountains, but will arrive here this week.

Several of the engineering students have already returned, and many are coming back to their studies on every train.

Woodstock is sending quite a large quota this year—graduates from her High School, which is under the charge of a U. N. B. graduate.

Everything points to a most prosperous year for the Old College on the Hill.

### The New Streets.

The sub-committee of the roads and streets committee, who met yesterday to consider the matter of locating some new streets, decided to recommend, first, a new street from Waterloo Row to University Avenue, through the centre of the lot upon which Mr. J. F. Winstons' new house is being built. They will also recommend the extension of Union Street to University Avenue, opposite Shore Street, commonly known as "Gas Alley." This street will run through the field immediately below the residence of Mr. Geo. N. Babbitt. It was intended to run another street from University Avenue to Waterloo Row below Lansdowne Street, near the Gregory Bridge, going through the properties of Mr. Jas. R. Howie, Mr. A. J. Gregory and Mr. H. Gunter, but this work will not be taken up until next year.

### Gone West.

## BURNS STATUE THANKSGIVING DAY

Details for the Ceremony on That Day Worked Out—Governor Fraser of Nova Scotia to Be Orator of the Day.

At a meeting of the Burns memorial committee held last night at the office of the chairman, Mr. O. S. Crockett, N. B. telegrams from the McIntosh Guise Company, Ltd., Toronto, the contractors for the erection of the proposed Burns monument, was submitted stating that the firm would have everything in readiness without fail for the unveiling of the monument by Thursday, the 18th day of October—Thanksgiving Day—and that the pedestal would be shipped from the Stansfeld granite shops not later than the middle of next week. The statue has already arrived in the city, as reported by the Gleaner a few days ago. Mr. Quartermaster, the contractor for the foundation, completed his work on Tuesday so that everything will be in readiness for the erection of the pedestal and statue as soon as the granite arrives.

Lieut. Governor Fraser, of Nova Scotia, who was selected some time ago as the orator of the day, was communicated with to ascertain if Thanksgiving Day would suit his convenience, and his honor having informed the committee that it would suit him, the latter body last night authorized the announcement that the unveiling ceremony would take place on the afternoon of that day.

Invitations will be extended to all the Scottish societies of the maritime provinces and the railway companies will be applied to at once for excursion rates from all points in New Brunswick. Sub-committees were appointed to look after the various details of the celebration and every effort will be made to make the day one long to be remembered in the history of Fredericton.

## SCHOOL MATTERS TRUSTEES MEET

Applicants for Position of Truant Officer—Want Increase of Salary—Conference Upon School Grading.

The Fredericton public school board were in monthly session yesterday afternoon, Dr. Atherton presiding, and Messrs. Weddall, Sharkey, Spurgeon, Dr. Vanwart, Mrs. W. G. Clark and Secretary Sampson in attendance.

The secretary's report announced the completion of the addition to the Morrison's Mill school house, and also a present register of 67 pupils there with an average attendance of 50, portending the early appointment of a second teacher to that district. It also mentioned the return of Miss Thorne, Miss Richardson and Miss Lucas to the charge of their respective departments.

A communication was read from Chief Superintendent Inch acknowledging the arrival of Lieut. Gov. Snowball's silver medal for general proficiency in the sixth School, Miss Gladys Kitchen, daughter of Mr. Willard Kitchen, being the winner.

In response to Dr. Inch's request for a date to be fixed for presentation of this prize, which is a very handsome one, the board fixed the day for public school exercises before the Christmas holidays.

Applications were read from James Roberts and Othello White for the position of truant officer. This makes four candidates in this field, the others being W. J. Southern and Rich and Gregory.

A bill for \$61.50 for professional work by Architect Minnie in the case of the Morrison's Mill school house was ordered to be paid, together with the final instalment of Contractor Mitchell's account, which in all totaled \$1,290.

Mr. Perry, principal of the Charlotte street school, made a requisition for repairs and supplies for that school, and the matter was referred to the building committee.

Application of one of the male teachers and from one of the school janitors for an increase of salary were read, and following the rule were held in order to complete the month's notice necessary.

On motion of Mrs. Clark, the secretary was instructed to write the secretary of the city teachers' association soliciting a conference between them and the school board upon the matter of the grading examinations. Some evening at an early date will probably be agreed upon for this.

A request of Miss Thorne, secretary of the York and Sunbury Teachers' Association for the use of the York street school assembly room for that body on Oct. 11th, the opening day of their annual meeting here, was complied with.

The board was very gratified to receive at this meeting from Mr. Arthur Shipp, lecturer, a complete set of the new edition of Redpath's Library of Universal Literature, being fifteen volumes in all, as a free gift to the Fredericton High School Library. This is both a handsome and very useful donation, and the thanks of the board on behalf of the High School department was ordered to be returned to the generous donor.

A request from the parents of two children attending the city schools, for books, as per regulation for indigent pupils, was ordered to be granted by supplying the deficiency.

Minor matters of routine completed the business of the session.

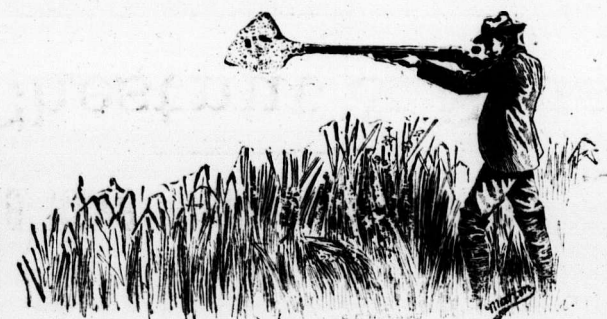

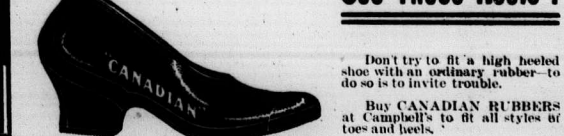
